

British loss on Monduy was not as heavy as at first reported. A careful calculation of the British losses in all the engagemente since, the outbreak of hostilities—excluding the casualities among the non-commissioned ufficers and men in Monday's reverse at Ladgemith, which are thus far nnknown here—gives a total of 916, to which probably 1,200 will need to be added when details regarding the Ladgemith reverse are received. This total is made up as follows :— Officers, 138, being 19 killed, 61 wounded and 53 captured. Men—783, being 137 killed, 492 wounded and 134 captured. Oct 29 th.—The gsrrison at Ladysmith, are honrly expecting an attack. The Boers are gradually closing around the city. They have mounted several heavy guns about 4,500 yards from the British camp. It is setimated that the enemy's force, within 6 miles of the city, numbers 18,000 men. General Jonbert being in command. A despatch received from Ladysmith, says that although the Boers command the road between that city and Elandlaagte, the city is well provisioned. The enemy have commenced to advance on the British left. Of th.—At 520 this morning the attack on Ladysmith began. After seven shots, the British artillery silenced the Boer forty-pounders, with which they are shelling the city. Gen White, commanding the British troops in Natal, in his official report states that the Boer losses at Dundee, were 500 killed and woanded. Further d-lails from Mafeking, dolayed in transmission, said : that the town had withstood a four hour's bombardment on the 24th Oct, the only result being that one dog was killed.
