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Municipal Contests To Be Held In Alexandria, Charlottentown And Lancaster

Alexandria Will vote For Reeve And Councillors; Only Council Seats Are Sought In The Two Townships

Nomination proceedings in six Glengarry municipalities were quiet affairs on Friday, with entire councils in three districts being returned by acclamation and the heads of the other three municipalities also returning to office without opposition. Contests will be held for Reeve and Councillors in Alexandria, and for council seats in Charlottentown and Lancaster townships, other offices of these municipalities receiving acclamations.

Mayor J. A. Laurin returns by acclamation in this town, the other nominee, Alex. Lauzon, not having qualified. The Reeveship will be contested by Reeve Myles Campbell and J. J. McDonald, while seven qualified for the six council seats. Only newcomer is Arnold Weir of the Alexandria Hotel, the others being the present members of the Board. They are Angus Cameron, Ovilla Dufresne, Romeo Rouleau, Arthur Lauzon, Harold Stimson, and J. R. Legault. Others nominated for councillors were Dr. L. B. Primeau, Albert Lauzon and Raoul Clement, D. N. McRae and C. Lacombe were elected to the public Utilities Commission by acclamation.

Members of the Separate School Board elected are: Archie Gauthier, Dr. R. J. MacCallum and Raoul Clement.

The contest in Lancaster township will be for the three council seats, four nominees having qualified: Josephus Filion, Allan Archie McDonald, James A. McDonald and Gerald Sangster. Also nominated was Jas. A. McDowell who did not qualify. Both Reeve W. J. Major, and Deputy Reeve T. Scott Fraser received acclamations.

J. A. Sova, L. C. Kennedy, Phillip Legroux and Wilfred MacDonald are contesting the three council seats in Charlottentown township Robert McNaught, Reeve, and Howard Ross, Deputy Reeve are returning to office unopposed.

Balloting in Alexandria, Lancaster township and Charlottentown township will be held on Monday next.

MAXVILLE

There will be no contest in Maxville where Dr. J. Howard Munro is returned for another term as Reeve, with the following as councillors: Albert Boisvenue, E. A. Cameron, Duncan Kippen and E. S. Winter. Others nominated as councillors, but who did not qualify were: J. Dixon, D. W. Fraser and W. G. Leaver. A. D. Stewart was named to the Hydro Commission by acclamation, while other members are Dr. Munro and G. H. McDougall. For Public School trustees Daniel Ferguson, C. B. McDermid and C. G. McKillop were elected by acclamation, as they were the only nominees. Other members of the board are W. R. McEwen, H. A. Christie and Hugh Benton.

LOCHIEL TOWNSHIP

D. B. MacDonald, Reeve, was returned by acclamation in Lochiel township, as were the complete council slate, J. W. MacLeod is Deputy Reeve and the councillors are: Earle Capron, Lauchie McDonald and F. Legault. There were no other nominations.

KENYON TOWNSHIP

Acclamations were given Reeve Archie McKinnon, A. A. Fraser, Deputy Reeve and the councillors J. M. Leroux, P. D. Kippen and William Blyth, in Kenyon township. Only newcomer is Wm. Blyth of Dunvegan, who succeeds John A. Gray, retired. Others nominated were: For Reeve—A. A. Fraser, M. Leroux, J. A. Gray and Alexander A. McDonald; For Deputy Reeve—Malcolm Grant and J. M. Leroux; For councillors—J. A. Gray and Malcolm Grant.

Nomination Meeting Here Was Very Quiet Affair

Alexandria's Nomination Meeting, held Friday evening in the Fire Hall was a very quiet affair though it is to result in a contest Monday for the Reeveship and council seats. A lack of general interest was indicated by the comparatively small attendance, though the High School Commencement, that evening, may have had some effect on the number present.

During and following the nomination period, Mayor J. A. Laurin reviewed the year's activities and went over the Treasurer's Report, copies of which had been distributed to the meeting. In his talk Mayor Laurin referred to the excellent manner in which the road foreman, Mr. Lapierre had carried out his duties.

Reeve Myles Campbell reviewed the activities of Council in a brief address. Others who spoke following the close of nominations were Mr. J. J. McDonald, candidate for Reeve and Messrs. Romeo Rouleau, Arthur Lauzon, Harold Stimson and Angus Cameron, all of whom are seeking council seats.

Mayor Laurin Gives Resume

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the ratepayers of the Town of Alexandria for the honour they have conferred upon me by electing me Mayor by acclamation, for my nineteenth term and twenty-fourth term in the Council. I can assure the people of Alexandria that my appreciation of the honour has not been dimmed the least by its numerous repetition. This mark of confidence will urge me on to greater efforts on your behalf in the future. As in the past it will be my constant endeavor to keep the town on a good sound footing, and to further the best interests of our citizens without distinction of race or creed or fear or favor.

In view of the fact that very few citizens attended the annual meeting when a resume of the council's work was given, it might not be amiss for me to point out some of the achievements of the year for the information of our citizens in general.

During the year 1939 the council carried on its work in a spirit of co-operation, while there were differences of opinion at different times, not a single division was necessary to settle these questions.

The collections in practically every department were the highest in many years with taxes reaching an all-time high in September when \$20,000 was paid in over the counter.

Besides meeting all current expenditures, the council reduced the amount owing on county rates by \$3,000 and paid \$1800 on arrears of interest. \$1135 was set aside for reserve against doubtful taxes and accounts and \$1789 was set aside to reduce the accumulated deficit. An asset of doubtful value, the Woolen Mills property, valued at \$500.00 in previous years, was written off entirely. After this had been done there still remained on this year's operation a surplus of over \$500.00. Doubtful assets such as poll tax, dog tax, fines, etc., were not taken into account as assets this year. On the other hand the council did not overspend its estimates in any department. The books showing these figures have been audited by chartered accountants to Nov. 1.

On several occasions during the year the council was complimented by officials of the Ontario Department of Municipal Affairs on the efficient manner in which the council conducted the business of the town.

I believe that the members of council can be justly proud of this record. We are finishing, what is without doubt the most successful year's operation in my 18 years' experience as Mayor. I trust that with the co-operation of the men you will elect on Monday we will be able to repeat the achievements of this year's council next year.

RED CROSS NOTES

Toronto, Nov. 29.—Canadian Red Cross headquarters here today announced the organization had gone "over the top" in its war drive for \$3,000,000. Exact figures are not available but word of additional donations received from Alberta headquarters today carried the Dominion-wide total above the objective. Norman Somerville, National Chairman, announced last night that \$2,988,799 had been subscribed at that time.

The drive was aided yesterday by a donation of \$150,000 from a Toronto man who refused to let his name be published.

The Glengarry drive for members is meeting with great success according to reports received at headquarters here, with citizens responding generously throughout the county.

A shortage of buttons in the early stages has been eased by arrival of additional supplies which have been distributed to units together with stickers for cars and house windows.

The Distribution Committee has on hand a quantity of yarn for socks and is anxious to give out same as soon as possible. Two members of the Committee will be present in the Red Cross Rooms over the Post Office each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, from 2.30 to 4.30.

Headquarters in the Post Office building is now being occupied following renovations which included partitioning and the construction of shelves. The County and local organization each has its own quarters and knitting classes are already a weekly fixture.

In this connection the branch is indebted to Mac Lajole, caretaker of the Post Office who has, without remuneration, assisted the local officers in many ways and who has done considerable painting in his spare time.

The War Situation Day by Day

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 24th

LONDON—Powerful banking group formed to spur purchases in United States; preparations intensified to combat shipping losses; German fliers again scout Shetlands.

BERLIN—Three Allied aircraft downed, Nazis claim.

PARIS—French announce eight German planes shot down by Allies Thursday with loss of only one fighter.

HONG KONG—Japanese report capture of Naning in South China drive.

MOSCOW—Soviet verbal attacks on Finland continue.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 25th

LONDON—Admiralty says it has no knowledge of alleged capture of Deutschland, German pocket battleship, of which rumors are persistent. Air raid alarms sound again in South-Western Scotland. Damage to cruiser Belfast near Isle of May by mine or torpedo admitted Admiralty calls for volunteers to clear up mines. Japan, Sweden and Italy join Holland and Belgium in protest against extension of economic warfare to German exports.

PARIS—French reply with authenticated list of Nazi planes shot down in answer to Nazi denials that 22 have been downed in last few days.

BUCHAREST—New Tatarescu Cabinet takes office, causing concern in German, Hungarian and Russian quarters; German element in Cabinet reduced under Premier considered friendly to Allies.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 26th

MOSCOW—Soviet Russia tonight charged Finland with a border "provocation" in which 4 Russians were killed and 9 wounded. A note demands withdrawal of Finnish troops from the border area.

LONDON—Allied shipping suffered two severe blows during the week end in loss of the British armed merchant cruiser Rawalpindi, formerly a crack P & O Liner, and the Polish luxury liner, Pilsudski, 280 lives were lost on the Rawalpindi. Prime Minister Chamberlain says mine secrets are now known and the "barbarous weapon will not succeed."

ROME—Italy today released 300,000 men from the colors on "extraordinary winter leave."

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 27th

LONDON—King signs Order-in-Council extending British blockade to German exports after week-end of furious sea warfare, made more devastating by storms, in which 22 ships were sunk, crippled or listed as missing at cost of 350 lives.

MOSCOW—Workers are summoned to mass meetings throughout Soviet Union to hear charges Finland sought to provoke war by attacking Soviet border troops.

HELSINGFORS—Government announces that Soviet troops fired trench mortars along Soviet border and that if any Russian troops were killed they were slain by Russian shells; Finland is calm and heavy snowfall, an aid to Finnish defenses, regarded as good omen.

PARIS—French airplanes join British Air Force in combating German planes laying mines by parachute; War Office says Western Front quiet all night.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 28th

LONDON—Premier Chamberlain told the House of Commons today as the new session opened that Britain planned no vindictive peace; that the blockade of German exports would go into effect despite protests. Butter and bacon will be rationed January 8.

MOSCOW—Russia denounced its non-aggression pact with Finland. HELSINGFORS—Finland agrees to withdraw border troops if Russia does likewise in crisis over frontier incidents.

OTTAWA—Agreement on Empire Air Plan reached by Empire nations.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 29th

OTTAWA—Empire Air Plan calls for three-quarter billion dollar expenditure in three years with pilots turned out at the rate of 25,000 a year.

MOSCOW—Soviets make rapid preparations for war on Finland.

HELSINGFORS—Finns sending reply to Russia's denunciation of non-aggression pact.

LONDON—German plane shot down off Northumberland coast. OSLO—Reports of naval battle off West coast of Norway, with planes involved, are persistent.

PARIS Blockade officials announce seizure of two German freighters, totalling 10,000 tons. Military dispatches report that both French and German artillery were active on Western Front.

BERLIN—German High Command admits British planes attack German air base at Borkum, but says that raid resulted in no damage.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 30th

HELSINGFORS—Without declaring war Russia loosed vicious bombing raids on Finland today, attacking several cities and killing hundreds of civilians. Finland was invaded at several points and naval forces were sent against her. The country of 3,800,000 fought valiantly against the Russian 180,000 people whose leaders claimed they were merely protecting themselves from aggression.

LONDON—Premier Chamberlain declared that Russia was the aggressor and had rejected conciliatory offers from Finland for mediation.

WASHINGTON—Finns are still willing to accept United States good offices in mediating dispute with Russia. President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull confer on new aggression.

STOCKHOLM—Sweden alarmed at Russian onslaught prepares to call up extra troops. All Scandinavia reported to be greatly worried.

MOSCOW—Russians not told yet that Red army has invaded Finland.

Canadian Army Hut Drive Opens Here Next Week

GLENGARRY COUNCIL, K. OF C. TAKING PART IN NATION-WIDE CANVASS

Monday next the collectors chosen by the local Council of the Knights of Columbus will commence their canvassing throughout the County for the Canadian Army Huts.

Many will remember the great work done towards the end of the last war for the comfort and entertainment of our Canadian troops, irrespective of race or creed through the huts provided by the Knights and their friends.

When the present war broke out all war charities of this character were placed under the control of the Canadian Auxiliary Services, and the director, Brigadier Foster, notified the Knights of Columbus that their war services would consist first of supplying their chaplains with extras required over and above the supplies issued to them by the Department and, secondly, of providing army huts in Canada, England and France.

The Red Cross, Y.M.C.A., Salvation Army, Canadian Army Huts and similar activities will be carried on under the supervision of the Department and even should the war come to an end in the near future all funds expended will be used as provided by the War Charities Act under government control.

The present drive has been approved by the Secretary of State's Department and all contributors are assured that the Army Huts will provide comforts for all the soldiers free of charge. Huts are already in operation in Montreal and in Kingston and a director of overseas activities has already been appointed.

Knowing that all our troops will benefit irrespective of race, colour or creed, it is confidently expected that the contributions throughout the County will be generous, in spite of present conditions. Let us give till it hurts, and help the boys who are giving their all that we in Canada may continue to live in peace.

The Fourth Annual Commencement Exercises of Alexandria High School drew a full house to Alexander Hall last Friday evening when the students staged an entertainment quite in keeping with their four-star successes of the past. In plays, part-singing and instrumental selections they displayed the same polished work which has characterized previous exercises, here.

Highlighting the program was one of the most engaging plays to be produced here in years, "The Castle of Mr. Simpson," which humorously pictured the home life of a man with three marriageable daughters. The play was packed with laughs and they were brought out in splendid style by the well trained cast. The Ottawa Spotlight

OTTAWA, Nov. 28th. The Canadian War Supply Board, whose duty it is to buy supplies for Canada's war effort, and also to buy for the British Supply Board represented at Ottawa, about the operations of the board which will hereafter be under the ministerial control of Mr. C. D. Howe, minister of Transport. Up to this time Mr. Ralston, Minister of Finance, has exercised this control, but the heavy burden of responsibility of a Finance Minister in wartime is quite enough for one pair of shoulders, however broad. His regular duties will take up his full time. The supervision of the functions of the War Supply Board seems to fall quite naturally to the lot of Mr. Howe, who is an engineer by profession, who has directed the establishment of the Trans-Canada Air Lines, appointed a Transport Controller as an important war measure, and who supervises national harbors through the harbor board. His duties dovetail very closely in the national war effort.

MORE NEWS OF CANADA'S WAR ACTIVITIES
It has further been announced that hereafter there will be greater publicity about the operations of the Supply Board which is directed by Mr. Wallace Campbell. The present regulations forbid the publication of information about contracts for supplies under the contract's are laid on the table in parliament. It has now been decided to give out at least general information about the operations of the board which will throw more light for the people of Canada on the progress of the war effort. Beginning this week some details will be issued showing the manner in which the war appropriation is being spent. The information will of course be restricted to some degree by censorship and internal security regulations. The Prime Minister has further stated that he wishes the flow of useful news to the papers of Canada to expand rather than contract. Whether a general bureau of information will be set up is not yet quite clear, but there will be no undue restriction on news. There will be more rather than less news about Canada's war effort. A point made clear by the Prime Minister was that there is the closest coordination in the activities of all members of the British Commonwealth in carrying on the war. When the time came for plainer speaking this would be apparent to all.

OFFICIALS SELECT AIRPORTS FOR TRAINING PROJECT

Experienced officials of the Transport Department are flying these days

over wide areas of Canada seeking suitable sites for airports for the Empire Air Training project. Many airports already existing in the Trans-Canada Airways chain across Canada will be utilized at least in the early stages of the training scheme, but many more will be needed. Airports are not simply flat fields although absence of hills is an important factor. There must be grading and drainage. The runways must be firm enough to withstand the impact of planes coming to rest at high rates of speed. In addition there is the essential equipment to be installed, revolving searchlights, floodlights colored lights marking airport boundaries. It is quite evident that air training fields will not be established very close to large centres of population. Danger of accidents is to be avoided. During instruction a large number of planes will be in the air at the same time. The work of constructing the airports, not only the groundwork but barracks, hangars, etc., will continue throughout the winter so that spring will see the project in full career. In regard to the preliminary arrangements, the Missions at Ottawa have worked in the most cordial cooperation. Practically nothing but formalities remain to make arrangements complete. It is understood that the plan for an equitable distribution of the costs among the participating countries, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand and Canada, has been virtually agreed upon.

ORDERS FOR AIRCRAFT

It is further practically certain that large orders for the manufacture of aircraft will be placed immediately with Canadian companies. Not only the companies cooperating in the Canadian Associated Aircraft Ltd. but the whole of the aircraft manufacturing industry of Canada has been steadily expanding its plant during the past two years. Particularly marked has been the growth during the past year, so that these companies are now in a position to turn out large numbers of modern aircraft. Large orders for training planes, it has already been reported, are being placed in the United States, and it is believed these training craft manufactured both in Canada and the United States, will be an important part of the British contribution to the cost of the air training portfolio of government securities, project. The nature of the craft to be ordered in Canada is not known, but it is certain that Canada's part in the air services not only in air training, and in the Canadian personnel engaged, but in the manufactures of planes will steadily expand. It will be recalled that about two years ago, when Sir Francis Fould was High Commissioner at Ottawa, experimental orders for aircraft were placed with Canadian companies, and with this start as well as orders placed by the Department of National Defence for the R.C.A.F., the aircraft industry in Canada has blossomed into a new life.

CANADA'S ACTIVE SERVICE FORCE

During the past week general McNaughton, who has made an inspection of Canada's Active Service Force, has given assurance that Canada's citizen army, mobilized to play its part in the fight against Hitlerism and the forces of aggression, is being welded into an efficient military force. He was impressed in his tour with the fine type of men who have enlisted and with their seriousness. "The men have enlisted" the General said, "as a contribution to a great ethical cause, because of the threat to democracy by the totalitarian states which have erupted in Europe." The Minister of National Defence, Mr. Rogers, jointly interviewed with the military commander, said, "equipment of the First Division is moving steadily forward. The Picture we now have" he added "is reassuring in every respect." Mechanization of the units, partially arranged in Canada, will be completed in Britain.

Bank of Montreal Reports Expansion of Business-Assets Over Billion Mark

122nd Annual Statement Also Shows Record Deposits at \$914,000,000—Commercial Loans at \$220,000,000 Up \$30,000,000 Indicate Marked Increase in Industrial and Commercial Activity—Profits Slightly Higher at \$3,562,000, Equal 4.54% Combined Capital, Rest and Undivided Profits.

Outstanding of the features of the Bank of Montreal's annual statement, just issued, is the assets figure reaching over a billion dollars—a figure that is not only the highest in the long career of this 122-year-old institution, but a record in Canadian banking history. The statement, which is for the year to October 31, is published with the description "in easily understandable form," the various items of the balance sheet being accompanied by explanatory statements.

Characteristically strong, the bank's statement this year shows more than usual expansion in the more important headings, with commercial loans up nearly \$30,000,000—a reflection of the extent to which the bank has been assisting the industry and commerce of the country. These loans amount to \$220,548,911.

Notwithstanding this widening of credit, the statement shows no impairment in the bank's liquidity; in fact its quickly available resources, standing at \$742,603,867, are at a slightly higher percentage in relation to public liabilities, the ratio being 78.29 per cent. compared with 77.80 per cent. 12 months ago.

With total assets amounting to \$1,025,508,367, and liabilities to the public standing at \$948,502,921, the excess of assets amounts to \$77,005,446, which represents the shareholders' interest in the bank. This is made up of the capital subscribed, the reserve fund, the undivided profits and reserves for dividends, over all of which the public liabilities take precedence.

As is to be expected with the substantially higher assets, deposits show a considerable enlargement, standing at \$914,909,050—also a record figure—as against \$763,156,945 in 1938. Much of this increase is reflected in the bank's portfolio of government securities, which, with other high-grade bonds, amount to \$517,171,255, as compared with \$440,736,820 a year ago. Holdings of stocks total \$470,131.

The heading under resources "Money on Deposit with Other Banks" shows an appreciable increase over the figure of a year ago when it amounted to \$33,493,063. This year the figure is \$77,357,497—and the enlargement at this time is probably indicative of special banking transactions.

Of the remaining headings in the balance sheet, none show any substantial change from those of 1938, except call loans which both in Canada and abroad, have decreased, those at home amounting to \$4,573,822 against \$5,374,980, while those abroad at \$19,142,173 are down by \$2,000,000.

In the profit and loss account there is a moderate increase in earnings which amount to \$3,462,446, compared with \$3,398,390 in 1938. Dominion and Provincial Government taxes which the

After the deduction of dividend payments of \$2,880,000 and the setting aside of \$500,000 as an appropriation for the bank premises, the balance remained at \$82,446 which, added to the amount of \$1,183,254 in the profit and loss account a year ago, leaves a balance in this account of \$1,265,700.

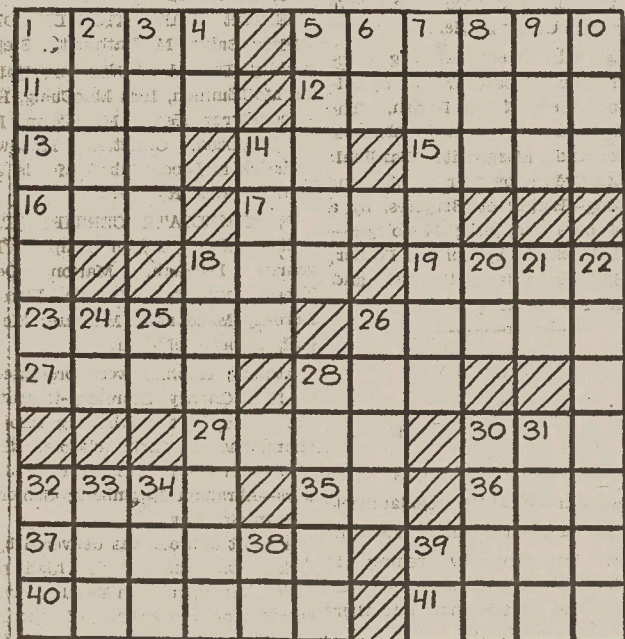

"Colonel McLeod says he travelled during the last war in all kinds of trucks and tractors and did not find the kilt at all unsuitable. But since then, mechanization in the army has increased enormously."

"There is much more sitting on cold iron and steel to be done, and in the kilt it must be very uncomfortable." And that seems to be the c-c-cold truth.

Those Annoying Little Ills That Make Life Miserable

It is a generally accepted fact that the really hard knocks which life gives us are more stoically borne than constant little set-backs.

In the case of one's health, the position is very similar. An operation, for example, ushered in by sympathy and flowers from friends, has its points for and against, but a perpetual crop of boils or spots, or a collection of warts is a very different matter and a tiresome, irritating one.

Your doctor will probably use a freezing preparation on a wart.

This treatment is only given for a few seconds, and one application is usually

sufficient, though occasionally two are needed. It is quite painless giving just a little pricking, tingling sensation at the time, writes a nurse.

SIMPLE METHODS

There are, of course, other simple methods that can always be tried, such as ordinary washing soda moistened in the mouth, and applied to the wart as often as possible during the day, or an acid solution bought from the chemist. This must be applied very carefully, and one of the best ways is with a pointed match stick and piece of blotting paper. The blotting paper should surround the wart, and so protect the skin; the match is dipped into the solution and just applied to the wart itself.

Some people find the frequent application of castor oil is effective; it is just a matter of trying which suits you best.

Boils are extremely painful, and of course, indicate that the general health is below par. A small dose of Epsom-salt each morning should help, and possibly a general tonic.

The actual treatment for a boil is to apply heat. This relieves the pain, and helps bring out the poison. But unless you've had boils before and your doctor has given you instructions on how they should be treated, don't attempt to apply hot fomentations without first consulting a physician.

INFECTIOUS STYES

Styes are very unsightly, and are also extremely painful. They, too, are usually due to an impure blood stream, and the need for more vitamin B, which can be taken in the form of yeast, and whole grain cereals. Just occasionally, however, styes are due to defective eyesight, so an oculist should be consulted in the first place. Then attention to diet and general health, with more fresh air and rest, should right matters. Much the same treatment is needed for a stye as a boil, in that heat is the chief need. A piece of lint can be tied round a wooden spoon, and dipped into very hot water, and then used for bathing the eye, as this is more effective than bathing with the fingers.

Styes are very infectious, so care must be taken not to infect one eye from the other, and all washing things should be kept separate.

Colored Wool Stockings

COLORED wool stockings are on London's fashion list and are a probability for the months ahead as silk ones get scarcer and higher in price. One kniggoo's manufacturer goes a step further and produces black wool ribbed ones with gold clocks for evening wear. They match a black wool evening sweater piped with gold at the yoke and neckline and are worn with a skirt that is just short enough to show a glimpse of the clock at the ankle line. Gold bracelets make a link between sweater and stockings. This ensemble was included in "Contemporary Clothes in Wool," first Wartime show given by the International Wool Secretariat in London.

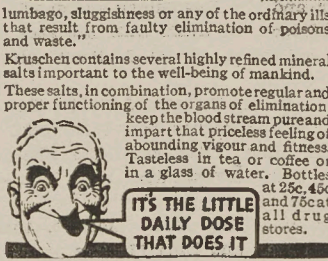

The Health League Of Canada

THE GALLUP SURVEY OF TUBERCULOSIS

Dr. George Gallup, Director of the American Institute of Public Opinion, recently asked a representative cross-section of the United States' public five questions in regard to tuberculosis.

The first question was: What do you think is the cause of tuberculosis? The answers indicate that the public still think that the so-called "allies" are more important in the causation than the germ known as the tubercle bacillus. The germ was given as the cause in 18 per cent of the answers. Malnutrition was given in 13 per cent; run down condition in 17 per cent. Poor living conditions in 12, while heredity, exposure to weather, bad foods and colds, drinking, smoking, etc., were made accountable for the balance.

The second question was: Do you think tuberculosis is contagious? Seventy-six per cent. said yes, and 24 per cent. said no.

To question whether or not tuberculosis is inherited 52% said yes and 48% said no. 86 per cent. thought the disease curable while 14 per cent. thought it incurable.

Asked for opinion as to... the best treatment the vote was in the following order:

Rest 43 per cent.
Proper diet 36 per cent.
Fresh Air 26 per cent.
Climate 25 per cent.
Sanatorium treatment 13 per cent.

"One cannot," says Dr. Gallup, "depend completely on statistics for one group says that 52 per cent. think tuberculosis inherited while 76 per cent. of another group says that the disease is contagious." It is obvious that the public still need instruction in regard to this affection.

The public should appreciate that tuberculosis is not inherited, that it is always contracted from some other person, and that rest, above all things, is the basis of cure.

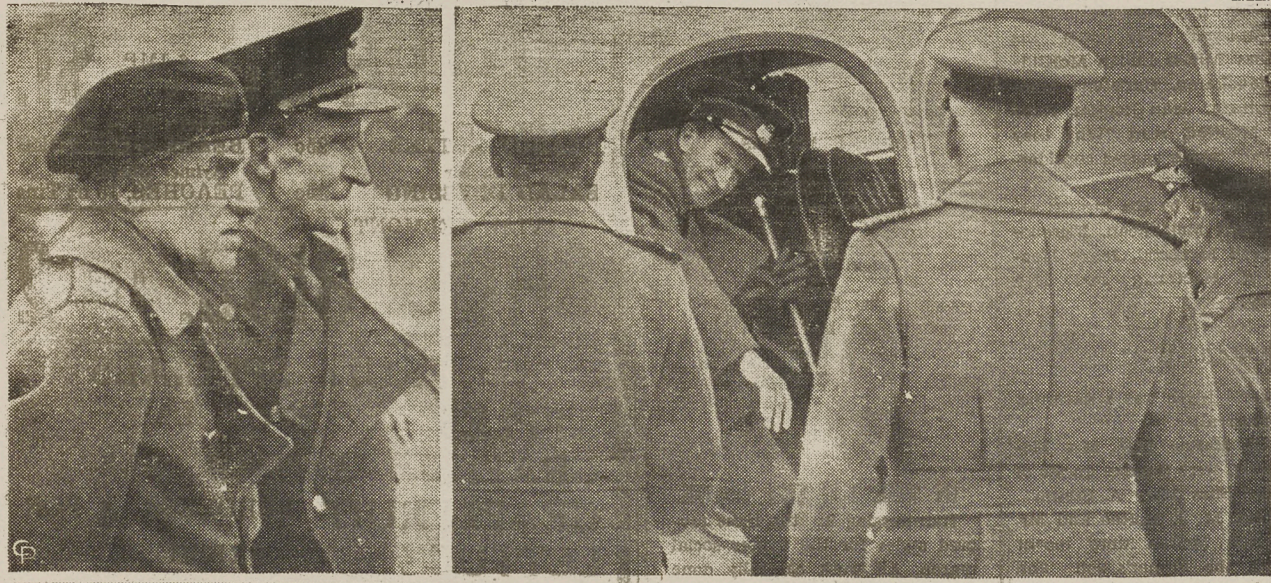

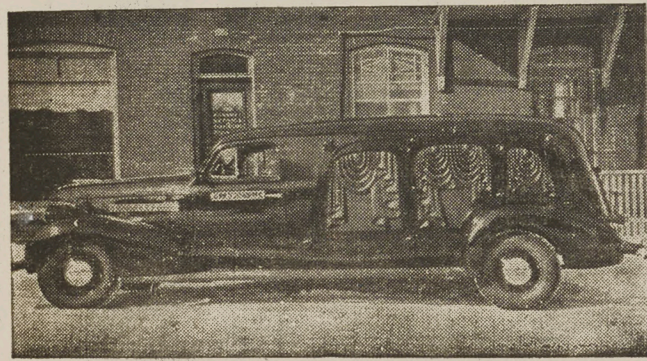

Farmers Are Not Profiteers

(By R. J. DEACHMAN, M.P., in the Toronto Daily Star)

Here and there, from the flippancy and uninformed, there comes from time to time the suggestion that the farmer is a profiteer. Don't mention this to a farmer, for if there is anything which makes him see red, stars in burning flame, it is the suggestion that he is out to beat the world and get rich by the blood of other men. He is not. To tell the truth, the farmer is the victim—not, in the main, of profiteers in Canada or elsewhere, but rather of economic and political forces which limit his freedom of action and make it extremely difficult for him to get a square deal. Sometimes, it is true, he turns upon men and institutions, for it is the tendency of people in all walks of life to seek a personal devil as the cause of their difficulties rather than by patient toil traced back from effect to cause and examine the things as they are behind the scene.

In times like these we must be careful about calling names. It is the easiest thing to challenge an action, point the accusing finger and say: Behold the profiteers! What do we mean? In general we apply that ignoble cognomen to the man who has raised prices following a declaration of war. Is that always fair? Let us take the case of the merchant. He has on hand goods valued at \$100,000. He knows that prices are going up. That is to say, his replacement orders will cost him more. He knows too, or thinks he knows, that, following the war, prices will probably come down. He will, if he is wise, ride it both ways—take the profit as prices rise and carry it to reserves, then drop prices as they fall, drawing on his reserves to recoup his losses and making throughout the era of shifting prices a normal profit—only a normal profit. If he does not do this he is likely to find himself in difficulties when prices decline.

The public rarely discriminates between speculation and gambling. A commodity such as wheat must be carried from harvest time until consumption. That is essentially a speculation. It is the carrying of a risk which must be carried. It is a speculation no matter whether it is carried by the grower, the owner, the elevator operator, or the man who takes the risk by buying an option on wheat. The gentlemen who do the speculating or perform this service of carrying commodities until they enter into consumption do not always win, they take big risks and

risk-taking is an essential element of our present economic system. He must be paid for his services.

The farmer is entitled to a higher reward than he receives. He must carry great risks—he ought to be paid for it. Crops are at the mercy of nature—prices are subject to the unfettered law of supply and demand. The rise in price of the things he buys limits his purchasing power. The result of all this is shifting, fluctuating changes in his annual reward which at time gives the impression that farming is the most speculative business in the world.

Here are figures showing gross value of Canadian agricultural production at different periods:

1928	\$1,808,000,000
1933	804,000,000
1935	952,000,000
1937	1,051,000,000

"Gross," in the sense in which it is here used includes all production. Net is much less because it eliminates the value of products consumed in the process of production, for instance, grain hay, roots, fed to livestock.

But eliminating the risk the farmer always runs from the uncertainties of nature his reward must vary greatly with prices. Let us make the comparison which measures the farmer's reward with the reward of the laborer in other fields—the price level reflecting changes in the farmers' income, the index of labor earnings from the Canada Year Book telling the change which took place in industry.

Farm Price Level	Index Gen. Average Weighted
1913	100.0
1928	158.4
1932	75.1
1933	79.8
1938	139.3

Alas, 1938 was an exceptional year for the farm so far as prices were concerned—in 1939, prior to the war, farm prices once more fell below the base level of 1913. This is a bad story but it could be made worse. In the five years of the depression gross Canadian farm earnings were less than one-half the 1928 level.

If we state the price level as representing farm earnings, then in the average of the depression years, farm earnings were 86% of 1913 level—wages 176.2%. Please do not tell the farmer that he is a profiteer!

Due to war conditions there has been an advance in farm prices and when some thoughtless people speak of profit

eering on farms they refer to a raise in the price of products which at the time stood far below the general price level are practically still at the 1913 level, while in that period other prices, the things he buys, stand on high plateau beyond the farmers' level, yes, beyond his reach. But all this aside—if you can find the means of making farm prices move up with other products during the war and then come down no faster than other products after the war, you will have done more than anyone else will ever do to make this and fit for heroes to live in.

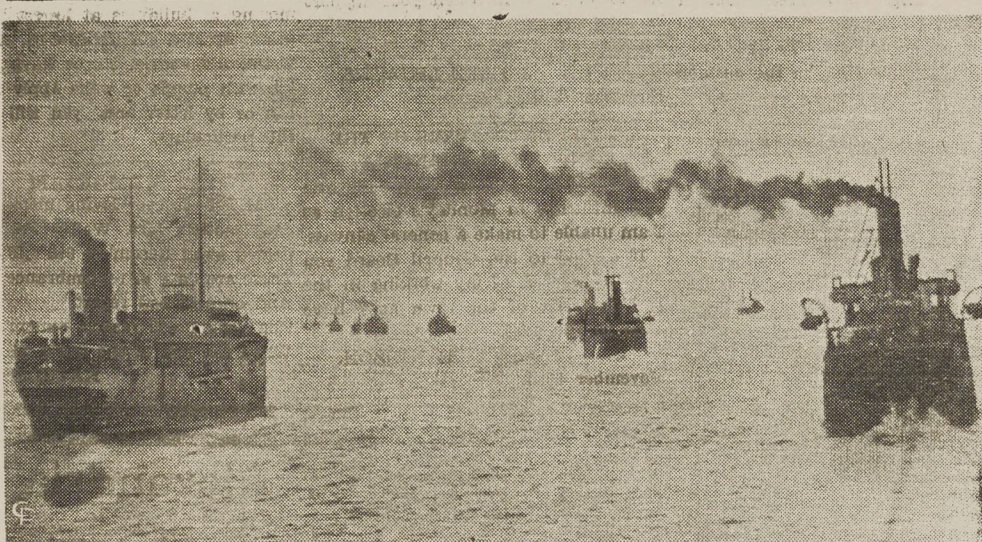

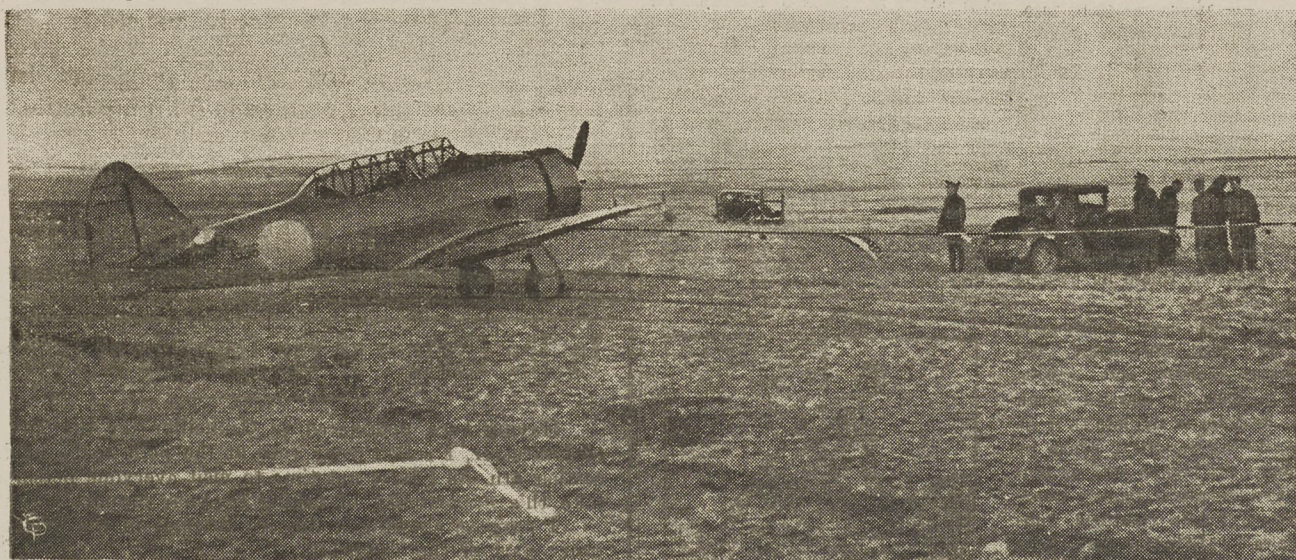
