

Three Candidates To Contest Provincial Riding On Monday

MacGillivray, Villeneuve And MacDonald Officially Nominated—Joint Meeting In Armouries Was Lively Affair.

Glengarrians will go to the polls, Monday, to select this riding's representative to the Provincial House and they will have the choice of these candidates who filed their official nomination papers with the Returning Officer, Mr D. D. MacKinnon, on Monday. They are E. A. MacGillivray, Alexandria, Liberal, Osie F. Villeneuve, Maxville, Progressive Conservative, and J. J. MacDonald, Alexandria, C.C.F.

That evening in the Armouries here, a lively joint meeting was held with the candidates being supported by speakers in English and French. Despite rainy weather there was a large crowd in attendance and interest in the approaching election remains high, an indication that there may be a record vote cast on Monday next in this riding. The Liberal candidate, E. A. MacGillivray, was given a majority of 1886 votes in the 1943 election when a total of 7462 voters in the riding went to the polls.

At Monday evening's meeting the Presidents of the three party associations in Glengarry presided jointly. Mr Villeneuve, Progressive-Conservative candidate, spoke first and he made an eloquent appeal for the support of Glengarry voters at the polls. Attacking the record of Glengarry's representative at Queen's Park during the past 8 years, Mr Villeneuve stated Eddie MacGillivray had done little or nothing in the way of furthering the interest of his constituents. He dwelt at length on the action of the Heppburn administration in handing over the power site at Carillon, on the Ottawa river, to Quebec and he pledged that the Drew Government would take immediate steps to develop Carillon for the people of Eastern Ontario.

Reviewing the fine administration of previous Heppburn Governments in the years from 1937 to 1943, E. A. MacGillivray called for the return of Heppburn and Ontario Liberals to Queen's Park. Mr MacGillivray recalled the many fine pieces of agricultural legislation instituted by Mr Heppburn which had for the first time in decades assured adequate returns to Glengarry farmers. He also pointed to the improvements and extension of hydro and highways in Glengarry under the Heppburn regime.

Speaking of his own record while Glengarry's representative at Queen's Park, Mr MacGillivray stated he had at all times done everything in his power to serve the people of Glengarry all classes and creeds, and he was assured his record would win a vote of confidence on polling dates.

J. J. MacDonald, C.C.F. Provincial candidate, had sharp criticism for both the Liberal and Conservative parties and he as well found fault with the type of representation Glengarry had had at Toronto and Ottawa in the past few years. This riding has suffered from a lack of aggressive representation throughout the war years, he said and he promised, if elected to put Glengarry on the map at Toronto.

Turning to the C.C.F. policies Mr MacDonald outlined briefly his party's programme, which, he declared was aimed at preventing any future depressions through monetary reform and better distribution of the purchasing power of the people. The steady

Glengarry electors will go to the polls twice in the next ten days to elect Provincial and Federal representatives. Interest appears to be at an unusually high pitch judging from the attendance at political meetings and it is to be hoped every eligible voter will cast his or her ballot.

On far flung battlefields of Europe and the Pacific, Canadian servicemen have been and are now fighting to ensure that democracy will survive—that Canadians will retain the right to choose their form of Government by secret ballot. In 1940 almost two million listed Canadian voters failed to exercise their franchise and here in Glengarry in the 1943 Provincial election, but 7,462 votes were cast as compared with 10,025 ballots in the 1937 voting.

Drew Refutes Jolliffe Charges

Addressing a capably crowd of some 500 in Alexander Hall, here, Tuesday afternoon, Premier George Drew referred briefly to the Gestapo charges of C.C.F. leader Jolliffe, which he declared were so incredible as to require no refutation. Premier Drew was enthusiastically received by the large crowd many of whom had to listen in to an outside loudspeaker when the capacity of the Hall was overtaxed.

The meeting was a short one, the Progressive Conservative leader speaking for but a half hour before leaving for Cornwall where he was to address a meeting at 3 o'clock. Also heard were the Hon. George Dunbar, Minister of Municipal Affairs; the Provincial candidate, Mr. Osie Villeneuve; and Mr. P. Tierney who spoke in French. A. A. Fraser, President of the Glengarry Progressive Conservative Association, was chairman.

The Progressive Conservative leader made no attempt in his brief speech to review the administration of his Government but spoke in general terms of its accomplishments. Referring to the 22 points of his 1937 platform, he declared every one of those points had been amplified fully and he went on to defend his introduction of the teaching of religion in the schools. Education he said, is the most important guarantee.

To Succeed Judge Costello

George E. Brennan, K.C., Of Cornwall, Named County Court Judge.

George E. Brennan, K.C., Cornwall barrister, on Tuesday was notified of his appointment as Judge of the County Court of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry and local judge of the High Court of Justice for Ontario. The appointments become effective immediately. It is expected that Judge Brennan will be sworn in at an early date. He succeeds His Honor, Judge F. T. Costello who has reached the retirement age. Judge Costello has held office since 1929, prior to which he had practised his profession in Alexandria.

A native of Ottawa, Judge Brennan is a son of the late Patrick Brennan and Bridget Kennedy. He has been a resident of Cornwall since February, 1925, and for the past 18 years has practised his profession in partnership with C. J. McDougall.

Judge Brennan graduated in Arts from Ottawa University and later attended Osgoode Hall, being called to the Bar in Nov. 1922. He practised in Toronto for a little more than two years and then came to Cornwall.

C.N.R. Agent Going To Bainsville

A. H. Johnston, C.N.R. agent here for the past eight years is being transferred to Bainsville, and will take over the agency there within the next few weeks. Mr Johnston's successor, here, as agent, has not yet been named.

Glengarry Herd Sire To Leeds

A Glengarry county herd sire, Elmcroft E. Paul Echo, has been sold by Mr J. J. McMaster, Laggan, to the artificial breeding unit in Leeds County, at Forfar, which is partially sponsored on an experimental basis by the Ontario Cheese Producers' Association.

Mr. McMaster has also sold two heifer calves from the bull, Elmcroft E. Paul Echo, to the Renfrew County Calf Club. J. D. McMaster of Laggan has recently disposed of two choice cows to Kemptville Industrial School as well as selling two heifer calves to the Renfrew Calf Club.

The herd sire Elmcroft E. Paul Echo which J. J. McMaster has sold to the Leeds County unit was bred by Ray McLaughlin, Elmcroft Farms, Oshawa. Every female in his pedigree for three generations back is qualified in R.O.P. and every bull has qualified daughters. Every milk test shown in his extended pedigree is over 3.6 percent, fat and there are several over 41 percent. On his sire's side he is a great-grandson of Sir Star Laura Segis, who was twice All-American bull and he had a daughter which held the Canadian 3-year-old record. On his dam's side he is a grandson of Rowsdale Realization, a well-known bull who was a grandson of Springbank Snow Countess and Pontiac Dutchland Devries, two famous females by T. R. Dent from which the monument was erected, Rowsdale Realization's sire, Springbank Expectation, sold to Japan for \$5,000.

Mr Wilkes was born at Fournier, in February 1864, a son of the late John Wilkes and Margaret Hunter. In 1889 he married Nancy Nixon, also of Fournier and she predeceased him in October of last year.

Mr Wilkes is survived by three sons and two daughters—Albert J. at home; Clifford at Vernon; Henry A. and Mrs Dora Campbell in Maxville, and Mrs A. G. MacGregor, MacDonald's Grove. A brother, Albert Wilkes of Fournier, and a sister Mrs Mary Means of Missouri, also survive. He also leaves five grandchildren; Martha, Margaret and David MacGregor and Jean and Bobbie Wilkes.

Bainsville Youth Accident Victim

John Robinson, 21, Killed When Car In Collision With Bus At Toronto

John Robinson, 21, of 923 Palmerston Blvd, Toronto was killed instantly Wednesday evening when the auto he was driving east on Hoskin Ave. in Toronto was in collision with a T.T.C. bus about 20 yards west of Queen's Park Cres.

The bus, in charge of Operator N. B. Robb, of the Davenport division, was out of service for about half an hour, but none of the passengers was injured beyond a shaking up. The auto was almost completely wrecked.

T.T.C. officials and police report Robinson's auto was in head-on collision with the Hill Route bus just as it was turning off the Eastern Queen's Park Cres.

He was removed to the General Hospital where he was pronounced dead of head injuries. Dr. W. Eason Brown, coroner, announced an inquest would be held.

With the fatality, Toronto's traffic toll was increased to 31 deaths, as compared with 22 for the corresponding period a year ago.

John Robinson was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Robinson, who moved to Toronto from Bainsville, ten years ago. Besides his parents, he leaves two brothers and two sisters—William Robinson, overseas with the R.C.A.M.C., and Leslie Robinson, who recently returned from overseas and is recovering from wounds suffered in action; Mrs. J. Moir, Toronto and Miss Carol Robinson, at home.

John Robinson was a nephew of Mrs. D. A. Condie, of Bainsville, and Mrs. Jerry McCabe, Cornwall, sisters of his mother.

POW Reaches Home

Liberated from a German prisoner of war camp in April, Pilot Officer Lawrence J. McCosham reached his home in Cornwall, this week. A son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. McCosham of Cornwall, formerly of the Fifth Concession of Lancaster township, P.O. McCosham had been a prisoner since being reported missing after air operations Dec. 9th, 1942.

Monsignor William J. Smith, Named Bishop Of Pembroke

Pastor of St. Columban's Church, Cornwall, Will Be Consecrated Bishop, In Alexandria During Month Of July



THE NEW BISHOP-ELECT

Rt. Rev. Monsignor William J. Smith D.P., D.C.L., a widely known and well loved member of the Diocesan clergy and a native son of Glengarry, has been named Bishop of Pembroke, in succession to Most Rev Leo Charles Nelligan, according to an announcement at Ottawa, last Friday night, by Msgr Ildebrando Antoniutti, Apostolic Delegate to Canada and Newfoundland. His Excellency Bishop Nelligan, who has resigned his post because of ill health after serving as Senior Roman Catholic Chaplain with the Canadian Armed Forces, has been transferred to the titular See of Fenice.

Msgr Smith will be consecrated Bishop in St. Finnan's Cathedral, Alexandria, at a date in July yet to be set.

The announcement of his elevation was enthusiastically received throughout the diocese and in a particular manner in Alexandria, where Msgr. Smith has spent so many of his priestly years. Before being named pastor of St. Columban's parish, Cornwall, October 1st, 1944, he had been rector of St. Finnan's and chancellor of the diocese.

Born at Greenfield, Glengarry county on January 2, 1897 Msgr. Smith is the son of Duncan Smith and the former Catherine Grant, Lot 13, Fourth Concession of Kenyon Township. He attended the local school and Alexandria High School before making his classical studies at the University of Ottawa and Seminaire de Joliette, Que. He studied philosophy at St. Augustine's Seminary, Toronto, and theology at the Grand Seminary, Montreal. Following his ordination at Alexandria on June 16th, 1927 he served as curate at Glen Nevis until his appointment as curate of St. Finnan's Cathedral in 1928.

In 1931 he was appointed secretary to the late Bishop Couturier and a year later proceeded to Rome where he followed a course of studies at the Angelicum Pontifical Institute, leading to the degree of Doctor of Canon Law which he obtained in July, 1935. He was appointed chancellor of Alexandria diocese in 1935 and held that office until October, 1944 during which years he also served as assistant priest and later as rector of St. Finnan's Cathedral, here.

On August 8, 1943, he was invested with the dignity of a Domestic Prelate to His Holiness, Pope Pius XII. Msgr. Smith's elevation to the episcopate marks the fourth time that a priest from what is now the Diocese of Alexandria has been appointed Bishop. In 1890, the late Rev. Alexander Macdonell became Bishop of Alexandria and eight years later the late Rev. C. H. Gauthier was appointed Archbishop of Kingston, Archbishop Gauthier later became Archbishop of Ottawa. In 1906, Rev. William A. Macdonell was named Bishop of Alexandria.

In addition to his parents, the new Bishop elect has one brother and two sisters: Mr Alex Smith of Greenfield; Mrs Donald Emberg of Glen Roy; and Mrs D. Ernest McDonald of Detroit, Mich. His appointment as Bishop of Pembroke comes as an honor to his family the diocese and to his native Glengarry which has contributed so many of its sons and daughters to the enriching of the spiritual life of the country.

FO McIntyre Now Presumed Dead

Missing on active service since October 15, 1944, Flying Officer Lynden A. McIntyre, 29, is now for official purposes presumed to be dead, according to word received by his parents Mr and Mrs. P. D. McIntyre, of Apple Hill. He attended public school at Apple Hill and high school at Avonmore. When he enlisted in the R.C.A.F. in May, 1942, he was with the Department of Munitions and Supply, Ottawa. Graduating August 20, 1943, at London, Ont., as navigator he was commissioned Pilot Officer the same day and went overseas in September, 1943, as Pilot Officer. He was promoted to Flying Officer in April, 1944.

On October 1, 1941, he married Marjorie Horsfield, of Moose Jaw, Sask. Mrs. McIntyre resides at 133 Echo Drive, Ottawa. He is survived by his wife, his parents, and a sister, Miss Eileen M. McIntyre, Reg. N., on the staff of Cornwall General Hospital.

tomato plants on Friday, May 25. We hope that those of you have planted are withstanding the cold weather.

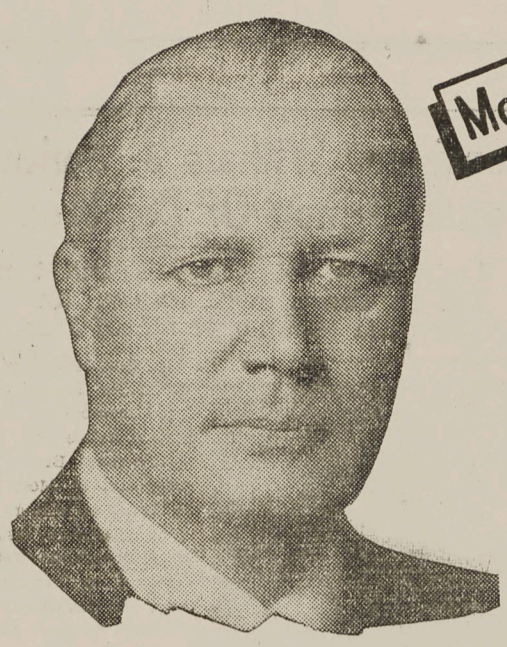
On Tuesday, May 29th Mr Stringer of the National Film Board showed grades 9 and 10 films entitled "Weeds"



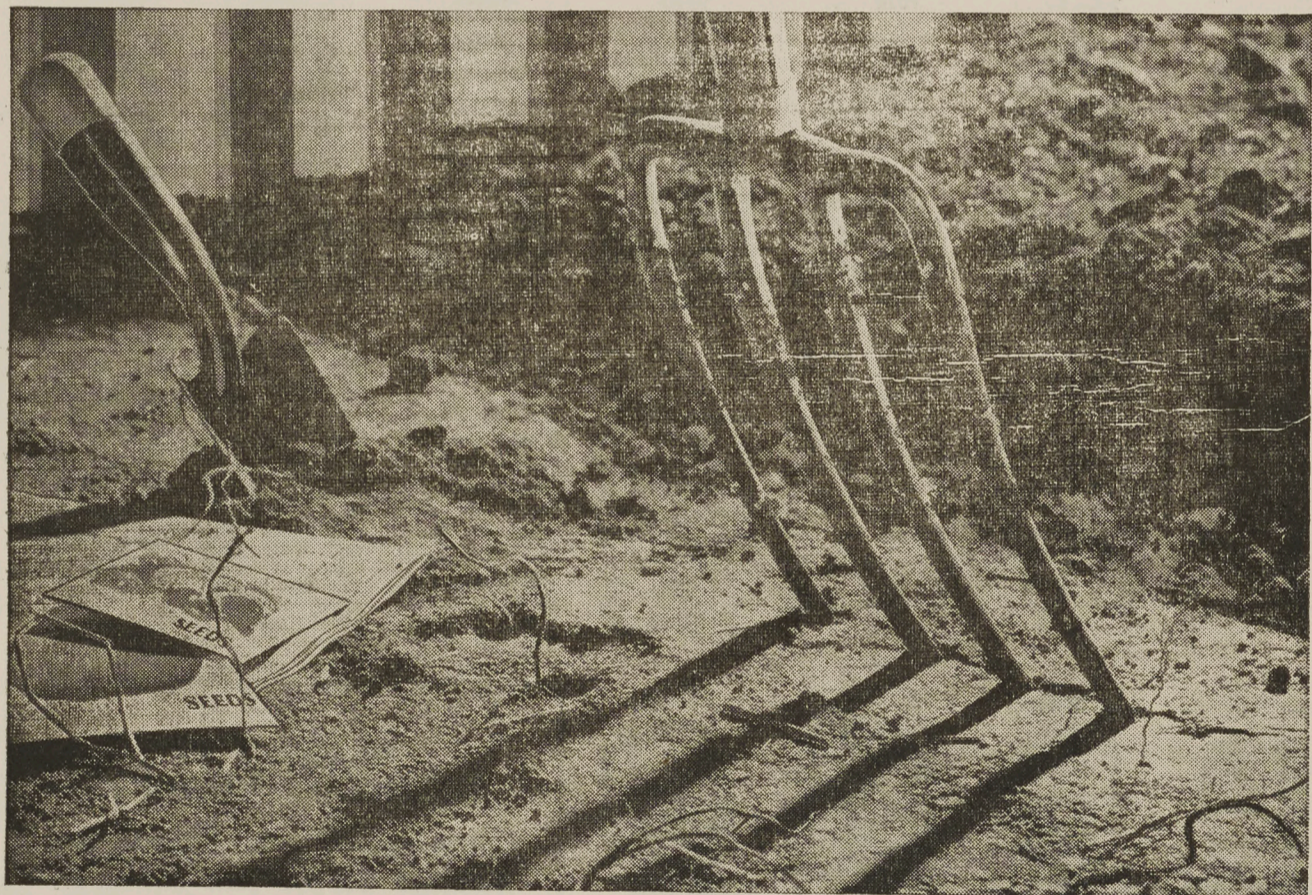

NOTICE To Active Service Voters who are absent from their units

The attention of members of the Navy, Army and Air Force and all other persons who qualify as Active Service Voters under the Ontario Active Service Voting Regulations, 1945, is directed to the following provisions.

1. Active Service Voters at their homes.

Active Service Voters who are in their place of ordinary residence on polling day may vote in the manner prescribed by the Election Act for civilian voters, whether or not their names are on the Voters' List, on taking a declaration (Form 8A) before the deputy returning officer.

Such voters may vote at the regular polling place for the voting sub-division in which they reside.

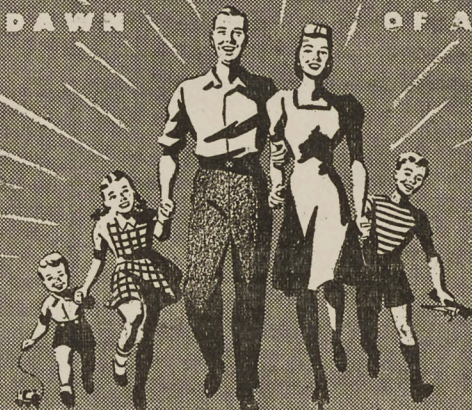
2. Active Service Voters on Leave or Furlough.

Active Service Voters who are absent from their units but not in their place of ordinary residence, on leave or furlough, including such voters on farm leave or industrial leave, may poll their votes with any commissioned officer appointed to take the votes of Active Service Voters, on producing to such commissioned officer documentary proof that they are on leave or furlough and provided that they have not already voted in the election.

Such voters should apply to the nearest Naval, Military or Air Force headquarters for information as to the location of the Commissioned Officer nearest to their present address.

Corn For Grain

The continued wet weather of the past few weeks has delayed seeding in areas throughout Ontario and farmers are now confronted with the problem of producing sufficient grain for their own requirements. Hybrid corn offers a partial solution to this problem. The introduction of early maturing hybrid varieties has made it possible to produce grain of this crop over a wide area. Yields comparable to oats and

barley may be expected and greater yields are possible as the season advances and it becomes too late to sow oats and barley. Considering the higher weight per bushel, lower fiber content and total digestible nutrients, this grain is worthy of greater consideration.

Those who plan on planting hybrid corn should make sure that the variety which they obtain will mature in their district. The maximum feeding value of ear corn can be obtained only from grain that will remain sound and free from moulds in storage, therefore one must select a variety that is of known suitability to the soil and climatic conditions. For those who have not already purchased varieties of early corn suitable to their area, the following varieties which mature in 80-90 days are known to be available in moderate quantities.

For Glengarry county the following Canada Hybrids are available:—Canada No. 275, No. 279, and No. 355

The conditions most favorable to corn growing are high temperatures and a long growing season. The crop responds to favourable moisture conditions and prefers a fertile, deep, loam soil. Corn for grain should be planted as early possible in order to take advantage of the full growing season.

Hybrid corn must not be planted too thickly. A good objective in hill planting is to have three plants per hill and in row planting about one plant per foot as the final average stand. At this rate of planting, one bushel of seed should be sufficient for 6-10 acres,

therefore the initial outlay for seed per acre is very low.

Farmers requiring seed should contact local seed dealers, your agricultural representative or the Crops, Seeds & Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. Obtain Pamphlet No. 22 on "Hybrid Corn" from your agricultural representative.

Corn is an essential crop for the livestock farmer. When unfavorable weather lowers the yields of other crops, corn will often do well and the farmer who grows a fair acreage is always sure of plenty of feed as the crop may be used for fodder or grain, or both.

For full yield and best quality grain, the corn must be well matured before killing frost, therefore too much emphasis cannot be put on the importance of selecting a variety that has proven by actual tests to be adapted to the district.

Other fields are much too wet to put any type of implement on. Hay fields are not making the progress they should, although some early seeded fields of oats are making fair progress especially where drainage has been better than average. There has been some inquiry for buckwheat seed.

The demand for experienced farm labour fell off sharply during poor weather conditions. Very few inquiries were had during the past week.

Miss Lily McArthur, on her first visit to Glengarry, held the attention of all as she described her work among children up to 11 years of age, especially at Val d'Or. The work is carried on by study, worship, fellowship and service.

Mrs Campbell in her closing words, made clear the need of greater effort on the part of every woman "to win the world for Christ." Mrs M. N. McDonald had literature on display during the day Mrs S. D. McPhee, invited the 1946 Rally to meet at Avonmore.

The women of St. Columba congregation, served meals in the church dining-hall, in true Highland style.

Farm Legislation passed by the Hepburn regime for the farmers

Reduction in the interest rate on farm loans from 5% to 4%. Extension from 20 to 30 years of the time allowed to a farmer for paying off his loan.

Amendment to the Ontario Farm Loans' Act permitting a farmer to appeal to a judge for reduction in principal and arrears of interest on farm loans.

Extension of co-operative marketing and assistance to co-operative marketing agencies.

Allowances to farmers under the Co-Operative Marketing Act increased from \$30,000 to \$50,000, and the period for repayment of loans extended from 12 to 20 years.

Re-establishment of Cheese Boards to assist in orderly marketing. Re-opening of demonstration farms at New Liskeard and Hearst and appointment of additional agricultural representatives for Northern Ontario; seed grain tests and surveys undertaken; Ontario Field Crop Association established with affiliated Associations in 41 counties; modern seed cleaning plants subsidized until there were approximately 100 in Ontario.

Agricultural committee to increase production to meet war-time quotas; direct assistance in improvement and expansion of livestock breeding; campaign to increase milk production organized.

Agricultural war committees established in every county long before Premier Drew's proposal for establishment of county committees.

Inauguration of bonuses of 2c. per lb. on cheese, \$1.00 on Grade "A" hogs and 50c on Grade "B" hogs, resulting in a total payment of \$7,000,000 to farmers.

Subsidy of 55c. per ton on sugar beets and, with Dominion Co-operation, premium of 2c per lb. on wool.

Freight subsidy on feed grain from West; later, in co-operation with Dominion, assumption of freight rates on feed and cattle from West.

Development of Ontario Farm Service Force, placing thousands of trained workers on farms and providing other thousands of volunteer helpers.

Rural Hydro Service Charges reduced by 57%; number of consumers required per mile lowered from 3 to 2; 50% of cost of rural line extensions assumed by Province and Standard Service Charge cut in half.

Hepburn's present farm program is designed to meet the current needs of the Ontario farmer. Hepburn always takes care of the agriculturist.
