

## Hon. Farquhar Oliver Elected Leader Of Ontario Liberals

Enthusiastic Convention At Toronto Last Week Attended By More Than 600 Delegates — Regret Expressed In Death of Dr. MacDiarmid

On Friday afternoon of last week the Ontario Liberal Convention elected Honourable Farquhar Oliver as Leader of the Liberal party in Ontario amid scenes of enthusiasm which augur well for the future of the Liberal cause in this Province. Mr. Oliver had been acting as House Leader in the Legislature since the General Election of 1945 but had not had much opportunity of displaying his fighting qualities in view of the small representation of Liberals elected and of the fact that he had not received a mandate from the Party as a whole to assume the leadership.



HONORABLE FARQUHAR OLIVER, M.P.P. for Grey South since 1926, who last Friday was selected as Leader of the Ontario Liberals at the party convention in Toronto. Leader of the Official Opposition for the past two years, Mr. Oliver is but 43 years old.

Seven candidates for leadership were nominated, two of whom, Honourable P.M. Dewar former Minister of Agriculture in the Hepburn administration, and W.A. Moore of Toronto withdrew before the balloting took place. Opposing Honourable Farquhar Oliver in his bid for the leadership were Colin Campbell, a former member of the Hepburn Government; Mr. A.I. Cadeau, Burlington industrialist, a leader of the young Liberal group; Allan Lamport, Toronto Insurance Broker, and William A. Gunn, also of Toronto.

In his opening remarks Mr. Colin Campbell warmly endorsed the candidature of Honourable Farquhar Oliver and explained that he had merely bowed to the wishes of a number of prominent Liberals in allowing his name to go before the Convention, thus paving the way for the Oliver slide which followed.

A largely attended and enjoyable reception was tendered Mr. and Mrs. Howard Morris in Alexander Hall, Friday night, following their return from their wedding trip. Relatives and friends were present from every section of the county and from outside points as well.

Dancing was enjoyed to the music of Heward's orchestra and following the supper Angus H. McDonell spoke briefly and the presentation of a purse was made by Alex. McKinnon.

Earlier in the week the Management Committee had met on Wednesday evening and had approved of the Convention programme and decided upon the Committees which would direct the affairs of the Association during the year 1947.

## Montreal Bus Service Resumes

The Convention itself opened Thursday morning with the work of the annual meeting attended by all the delegates and on Thursday several of the Committees reported on the years activities and a number of resolutions were disposed of.

Following a six-weeks interruption due to road restrictions Victory Bus Lines of Montreal, on Tuesday of last week resumed their Alexandria bus service. The Company will operate on a twice daily schedule with additional service on week ends.

The Nominating Committee had suggested the name of Colonel Hamilton as President, but an amendment was moved from the floor of the meeting that Honourable Norman Hipel, former Provincial Minister of Labour should be the new President and this motion was carried. Colonel Hamilton coming forward immediately and making the nomination unanimous. Mr. Hipel had been very active as head of the Policy Committee and as a member of various other Committees of the Association and his appointment as President was a very popular one.

## Lochiel To Vote On Sale Of Beer

Council Sets June 25 As Date For Ballot On Referendum

Lochiel Township will hold a referendum on Wednesday, June 25th, on the question of legalizing the sale of beer in the municipality. A proclamation is being issued this week announcing the date and notifying the electors that a meeting will be held in the Township Hall, June 18th, when the names of managers for the Affirmative and the Negative will be announced.

The by-law authorizing the vote was passed at a meeting of the Lochiel council, May 6th, following receipt of a largely signed petition circulated, we understand, by Phillip St. Onge, proprietor of the Glengarry House, Glen Robertson.

There will be two ballots, one seeking opinion on the sale of beer under public house licence for men only, the second on licensed premises to which women are admitted. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

A complete report of the meeting held in Lochiel Township Hall, May 19th, to organize the "dry" forces of the township, will be carried in our next issue.

## Charlottenburgh Tax Rate Is Up

Charlottenburgh township's general tax rate for 1947 has been struck at 22.6 mills an increase of 4.1 mills over last year's rate, it has been announced by L. C. Kennedy clerk-treasurer.

This year's county rate is set at 8.2 mills an increase of 1.8 mills over 1946; the township rate of 7.7 mills represents an increase of one mill and is due chiefly to increased road expenditure; the high school rate of 2.8 mills is an increase of 1.4 mills over last year's rate while the public school rates of 4.9 mills represents a drop of .1 mill.

Doubling of the high school rate was attributed chiefly to increased transportation costs for students.

## Revered Sister Dies St. Laurent

On May 2, 1947, the Congregation of the Sisters of Holy Cross was bereaved of one of its much esteemed members in the person of Sister Mary of St. Robertina (Catherine McCormick). Her parents were Robert McCormick and Sara Cameron of Lochiel. Their daughter Catherine was born in Lochiel in 1877. She entered the Novitiate at St. Laurent in 1898 and made her religious profession in 1900.

Sister Mary of St. Robertina taught very successfully in the schools of Adams and New Bedford, Mass.; Clayton, N.Y.; Manchester, N.H.; and St. Gabriel's Montreal.

In 1930 her health began to fail and she returned to the Mother House for a period of rest. Later on, she requested to do something for the children and was enabled to give of what strength she had in the education of young girls in the Juniorate at the School of Mary on Cote des Neiges Rd., Montreal.

Within a few years her poor health caused her to give up all contact with the children and she retired to the infirmary at the Mother House where, for many years, she suffered in silence and patience the disease that was surely bringing her to the tomb.

Sister Mary of St. Robertina was naturally a very joyful person, one always ready to give pleasure to others hence the long illness which kept her confined to her room and away from the ordinary daily works of the Community must have been a source of much sorrow but of much merit for her.

Sister leaves one sister in the Community, Sister Mary of St. Margaret of Scotland (Henrietta); Mrs. Allan J. McDonell, St. Raphaels; and Mrs. M. McMullan, Greenfield; also a brother, Duncan on the homestead and Dan in Windsor, Ontario.

An impressive last tribute of respect was paid the late Dr. W.B. MacDiarmid, ex-M.P. Glengarry, when an estimated three thousand people, among them Canada's Prime Minister attended the funeral held last Friday at Maxville. In addition to Mr. King the official party from Ottawa, included Hon. James G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, five other members of Parliament and Col. W.J. Franklin, M.C., V.D. Sergeant—At-Arms of the House of Commons.

Dr. MacDiarmid, who represented Glengarry at Ottawa from 1940 to 1945, died suddenly at his home in Maxville, Tuesday evening, May 13th. The very large number of sympathizing relatives and friends attending the funeral from every section of Glengarry and from many outside points included fellow members of the medical profession, representatives of the Glengarry Liberal Association and a large representation of members of the Masonic Order, in which Dr. MacDiarmid held a prominent place.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was filled to its capacity long before the hour of the service and hundreds were unable to gain admittance. The funeral was held at 2.30 o'clock from Dr. MacDiarmid's late home and the cortege was one of the largest ever seen in Glengarry.

Chief mourners were his widow: Mrs. MacDiarmid, the former Eva Smilie, one son, John William MacDiarmid; a brother, John MacDiarmid of Winchester; and two sisters: Mrs. R.A. Brodie of Montreal and Mrs. T. Fraser McOut of Sherbrooke, Que.

The service in St. Andrew's Church was conducted by his minister Rev. H.A. Doig, assisted by Dr. D.N. MacMillan, minister of Kenyon Presbyterian Church, Dunvegan.

Hymns sung during the service were "Unto the Hills" and "Art Thou Weary." Miss Netta MacEwen organist, presided at the console.

Mr. Doig in an eloquent discourse, paid high tribute to the physician who ministered to the needs of the community for upwards of half a century the man who never considered a duty to duty a trivial one. Mr. Doig said everyone present at the service and those who could not gain admittance were all mourners—the church was not able to hold all those who regretted the sudden death of "Dr. Will". Mr. Doig closed his touching tribute by quoting Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar."

Pall bearers, members of the Masonic Order, were Dr. J. Howard Munro, Henry A. Wilkes, Charles Munro, Colin B. McDermid, Wilfred R. McEwen and Hugh Blair.

Flower bearers, also Masons were J. Wilfred Kennedy, former Member of Parliament for Glengarry, and James Grant, both of Ottawa; T. W. Dingwall, J. M. McRae H. McEwen and W. S. McLean, all of Maxville. Interment was made in Maxville cemetery.

The Masonic service at the graveside was conducted by Howard Buell Worshipful Master of Maxville Lodge No. 480. Worshipful Brother R. A. Stewart acted as director of ceremonies.

A wealth of beautiful floral tributes the largest and most gorgeous ever seen in Maxville, banked the home where many called to pay tribute to the memory of the beloved physician and tender sympathy to the bereaved relatives. The family received a large number of telegrams, letters and cards of sympathy from near and distant points showing the sadness felt over a wide area at the sudden death of Dr. MacDiarmid.

Among members of the Masonic Order in attendance were representatives of lodges at Avonmore, Finch Alexandria, Vankleek Hill, Lancaster, Martintown, Cornwall Riceville and Maxville. The Glengarry Liberal Association was represented by the President, Mr. W. J. Major, North Lan. cester as well as other officers and members. Several prominent members of the Association were unable to be present through their attendance at the Ontario Liberal Convention in Toronto that day.

ment perhaps as early as the middle of July, with this being forecast by veteran observers along Parliament Hill.

#### LIBERALIZING CONDITIONS

The present amount paid and conditions surrounding same for old age pensions in Canada may be changed considerably. This has become evident since it is known that the Government has recognized the need for revision of such payments or conditions of same both for old age and the blind with the objectives of the program outlined in the Dominion-Provincial Conference in Aug. 1945 being still an essential part of the Federal Government's plans.

Moreover it is significant that a spokesman for the Government in Ottawa has made it clear that the machinery for achieving these objectives in social security must be attained within the framework of a federal state.

#### CAUCUSES AND SECRECY

It is understood backstage in the capital that greater secrecy has been advocated for party caucuses, these being usually looked upon along Parliament Hill as merely family affairs, though often discussions in these caucuses are forerunners of important

governmental actions or at least exert powerful influence on such decisions. It is however necessary at times to preserve strict secrecy about happenings at these gatherings of government followers because each can speak his own mind and matters are discussed in advance of legislation.

#### FARMER AND CONSUMER

The Government believes that during the transitional period from war to peace we should guide the farmer and the consumer back into a sound relationship under which they can deal with one another, emphasized Agriculture Minister Gardiner in the House of Commons. We shall endeavour to protect both from any middleman who tries to take advantage of seasonal supplies either to get his product too cheap or to sell it too high. The fact is however that the farmers income is higher over the last three years than ever before. Even with lower marketings of some products in 1946 as compared with 1945 the gross returns are increasing.

#### SLOW BUT SURE

The Canadian Government is endeavouring to cut down on its employees as much as possible and as quickly as this can be done without causing any harm to the machinery of government both inside and outside of Ottawa. This is becoming more and more evident along Parliament Hill as Canada's Civil Service is gradually being reduced in number. In fact the latest official disclosure here shows that the Civil Service has been brought down from a peak of 142,000 in May of 1945 to 129,000 at Jan. 1, 1946, though subsequent expansions brought it up again for a short period until it was once again reduced to 121,000 in the five months preceding April 1 last.

Likewise it should be reported that it is obvious here that the Government plans now to continue to cut down its employees by gradual stages with this being stressed in official quarters in the capital because of the inaccurate statements being made about it at the present time and the false impressions created that no such reductions are being carried out following the liquidation of remaining wartime departments.

#### NOT ENDED YET

Although the fight to legalize the production and sale of oleomargarine in this country was lost during this session, yet it is hinted in well-informed quarters in Ottawa that this fight has not ended with once again a bill being introduced at the first opportunity to legalize the manufacture and sale of this product, probably in the next session, if nothing official is done before hand to achieve this purpose.

#### NEW LOAN

When several high officials of the British Exchequer paid a visit to Ottawa in the wake of a statement by the United Kingdom Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton that Britain will be unable to meet the full twelve billions of blocked sterling debts owing to the sterling bloc, it was hinted in some circles that the real object of this visit was to renegotiate a new loan or credit for the United Kingdom. However, this does not seem to be the case at the moment though it is true that the \$1,250,000,000 credit by Canada has been disappearing rather quickly being more than half finished and may be gone by the close of 1947. In addition it is indicated that the British statement was really aimed at the sterling bloc creditors and not necessarily at Canada.

It is understood in Ottawa that the object of the British financial experts visit to the capital may be merely to discuss repayment of existing credit scheduled to start in 1950 and other interests involved in trade matters.

#### Old British Trees Witnessed Many Famous Historic Events

Many of Scotland's trees recorded happenings of historical consequence. Three hundred years ago a yew tree at Ayrshire's Loudon castle saw John, Earl of Loudon, ratify the Act of Union between England and Scotland. Prior to that historical day the Loudon yew heard many a dark plot hatched beneath its boughs by Scots hostile to the folk across the border. Beneath this very tree four hundred years previously the Scotch hero Bruce handed the castle to the Loudons. Another famous Scottish yew is that standing in Cruxton castle grounds. It heard the vows exchanged by Mary, Queen of Scots and Darnley; indeed, it was beneath its green arches that the ill-fated queen promised to marry Darnley, and, with the romantic heart of a woman, she caused the episode to be recorded for posterity by stamping the image of the tree on her coinage.

A yew with an equally intimate and sad knowledge of royal lovers is that at Ankerwyke house, Staines. Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn courted beneath that thick green roof: the tree, a solid veteran of many storms, proved more stable than the king's love, for Anne died by the axe. But Britain's ancient trees have witnessed historical happenings of greater significance than the amours of even royalty. For instance, the Ankerwyke yew's first connection with history was at the signing of the Magna Carta, the agreement between king and people on which is based the British conception of citizen's rights.

#### Hot-Bed at South Window

##### Of Basement Proves Worth

For the gardener who has a basement window with southern exposure, it is possible to build a practical hot-bed which is more easily watched, aired and watered than the standard type.

In front of the window make a shallow excavation about a foot deep. The size must be figured carefully, so that a frame set in this excavation can be covered by window or hot-bed sash. As in the case of other hot-beds, a glass substitute may be used on the sash, if desired.

Build a frame to fit in the excavation. The sides must slant sharply from a point above the window, almost to the ground. Fit the sash on this frame, using hinges at the top so the sash may easily be raised for ventilation. Earth may be banked around the frame to keep out the cold; and the sides should be as tight as possible to keep out the wind.

Heat is supplied to this bed by opening the basement window, and allowing the heated basement air to enter the bed. The window is left open at night, and may often be closed during the day, when the sun is shining on the bed. Hotbeds of this type have been tried and tested, and although they do not maintain temperatures as high as other kinds the heat will be more even, and the ventilation much better.

#### Placing Coal Bin

In planning a new house to be heated with coal, the location and construction of the coal bin should receive careful consideration, says the Plumbing and Heating Industries bureau. The bin should be located as closely as possible to the boiler or furnace; it should be well lighted; it should have a door adequate in size and easy to open; it should be dust-tight. In addition, the bin should be located so that it will not be difficult to fill. The bin should be so placed that a streamlined delivery of coal to the bin is possible. If there is a driveway next to the house, it may be practical to locate the bin under the driveway or inside the basement adjacent to the driveway. If the house has no basement, the coal storage room can be placed adjacent to the driveway without interfering with the design of the house.

#### Indian Steel Industry

In the pre-Christian era Indian craftsmen forged their high-grade iron ore into crude steel and shipped it to the Mediterranean area to be made into the famed "Damascus blades." The rustless, six-ton Iron Pillar, which rises near the Victory Tower, Kutb Minar, at Delhi, India, is estimated to be more than 1,500 years old. It was not until well into the 19th century, however, that India began large-scale mining of coal and iron—the essentials of big industry. Once started, expansion was swift. By the opening of World War II, the Indian sub-continent ranked after the British homeland as the largest iron-ore producer in the empire. Its extensive coal mines turned out about 25,000,000 tons annually, and gave employment to more than 200,000 workers.

#### Asiatic Corridor

Nature has made Afghanistan a corridor between inland Asia and India. Over its high passes swept the conquering armies of Alexander the Great, Ghengis Khan and others. In its tumbling mountain valleys, tribesmen carried on family feuds and fierce inter-tribal warfare. With the British rise to power in India, Afghanistan became known as a buffer state. Its independence was gained in 1919 in a struggle that reversed two previous wars between British and Afghan troops.

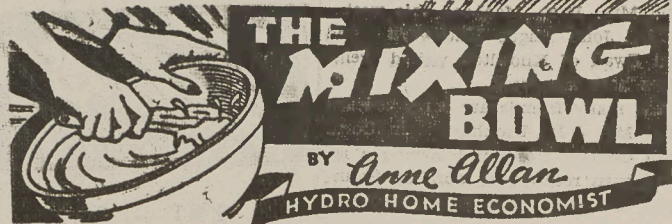

## What Is Inspired Democracy?

THE WORD DEMOCRACY has suffered much discredit from two causes. First it has been misused and twisted by extremists of right and left who have made it by turns a butt for their gibes and a cloak for their totalitarian aims. Second it has sometimes stood for nothing much except inefficiency because we who inherited

**Hello Homemakers!** When is a spot not a spot? Answer: When it has been removed by someone who knows how. Even spilled milk cocoa and ink can be taken out of white or fast-dye fabrics if you use the following remedies at once — with a little persistence and caution.

Milk grease and oil stains should be sponged with benzine or carbon tetrachloride.

**Ink spots** should be first blotted with blotting paper and then soaked with clear warm water or sour milk but in turn must be sponged out with carbon tetrachloride.

A chocolate stain should be scrapped off with a dull knife; then pat with borax which has been moistened with water. Let dry, then wash in clear water.

Chewing gum is sometimes difficult. Try to rub into a ball with a piece of ice; next remove stickiness with carbon tetrachloride.

Whether to soak soiled clothes or to set the machine immediately in motion is a moot question. Answer: If you do not use a water softener you should soak white fabrics.

What about using homemade soap for the new fabrics? Well, this is usually a very strong soap (often, not aged)—and since there are a number of tested laundry cleansing agents, it is wise to use these in the washing machine.

How long should the washing machine operate. We recommend 5 to 8 mins. for lightly soiled things 10 to 12 mins. for dirty clothes, then a change of water if necessary. There has been some controversy over this point but it was agreed that a short wash period and two or three warm rinses produced better results.

Should clothes be whipped or shaken when wet as they are hung on the line. To shake or pull gently after the garments are pinned will save much ironing work. You know too, that if clothes can be taken from the line and folded as they are placed in the basket the ironing will be much easier.

The family must eat on washday and we suggest dishes than can be cooked at a "low" temperature and served without much trimming. We recommend the Well Cooker of the electric range or grandmother's Dutch oven for the suggested meals.

(1) Pot Roast with Potatoes Onions Carrots, Steamed Pudding  
Time: 2 hours

Directions: Sear meat (3lbs.) in skillet until brown on all sides; place trivet in well, add 1 cup water and put meat on trivet. Put pudding in tall mold; cover, place beside meat. Cover cooker; turn switch to High until steam escapes; then turn switch to Low and continue cooking for 1 hour. Place vegetables around meat; turn switch to High until steam escapes; turn switch to Low to finish cooking, for about 1 hour.

**STEAMED PUDDING**  
3 tbsps. melted shortening, 2 cups flour, 3-4 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. ground cloves, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1.4 tsp. all-spice, 1.2 tsp. salt 1 cup milk 3.4 cup molasses, 1-2 lb. dates stoned and cut.

Melt shortening. Sift flour, measure add dry ingredients and sift again. Mix molasses and milk add to dry ingredients. Add shortening. Fold in dates. Pour into a greased mold and steam for 2 hours. Serve with cream.

(2) Veal Stew with Noodles Celery and Onions Spiced Bread Pudding  
Time: 2 1-2 hours

Directions: Cut 2 pounds breast or neck of veal into individual serving pieces. Flour and brown them in hot fat in a waterless cooker or deep kettle over High heat; season and cover with cold water. Cover, turn heat to Low and simmer for 1 1-2 hours. Add 6 whole medium-sized onions, 1 cup wide noodles and 1 cup of celery cut in short lengths. Set pudding in covered pan, place on rack above the meat stew cover and continue cooking for 45 minutes. Serve stew with meat surrounded by noodles and celery. Sprinkle with paprika and garnish with cress. Serves 6.

**SPICED BREAD PUDDING**  
1 cup toasted bread crumbs 1 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. soda, 1-2 tsp. ground cloves 1-2 tsp. nutmeg, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 cup sour milk, 1 cup raisins.

Combine bread crumbs with the brown sugar, soda and spices. Add the milk and raisins. Pour into greased pudding mold and cover.

### TAKE A TIP

How to use the modern Irons and Ironers:

Four new irons have striking features: (1) One has a wide sole plate curved for either forward or backward ironing, side rests to avoid lifting and a slanted handle to grasp easily. (2) To reduce fatigue caused by constant lifting another iron has been designed with rest-stand incorporated into sole plate. The button on the handle both releases and holds rest-stand in place. (3) A third iron has the outstanding feature of a stand with the heating element incorporated in it—heat is transferred to the iron whenever it is in position with the current on — no more wrangles with the cord. (4) Thermostat control on the steam irons means that they can be used for pressing or ordinary household use.

Methods used with electric ironer: With the exception of woollens, iron fabrics until they are dry. Take time to arrange garment carefully on board to avoid unnecessary wrinkles. Parts of garment to iron first: extra inside pieces such as inset pockets, shoulder pads and facings, and parts of garment which are attached such as trimmings and ruffles. Iron bodice of garment, then skirt. Finish with collar, cuffs and front. Wide articles such as tablecloths, sheets, bed-spread should be folded lengthwise and ironed on one side; then folded double and the top surface ironed; and so on until article is completely dry.

1. Try to improve ironing skill; use long sweeping rhythmic, graceful strokes.

2. Iron with weave of fabric not on the bias.

3. Iron all articles which require same temperature before starting on next group.

4. Arrange work area efficiently.

5. Dress neatly, attractively and comfortably for the job.

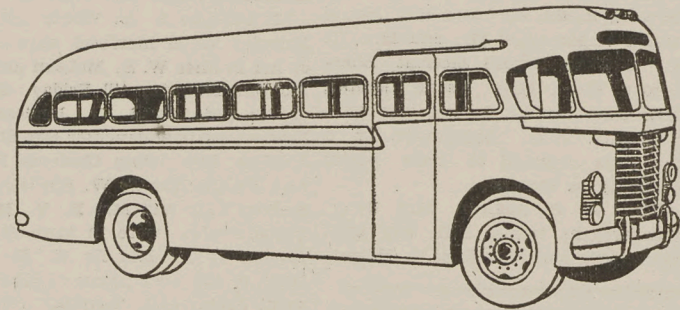

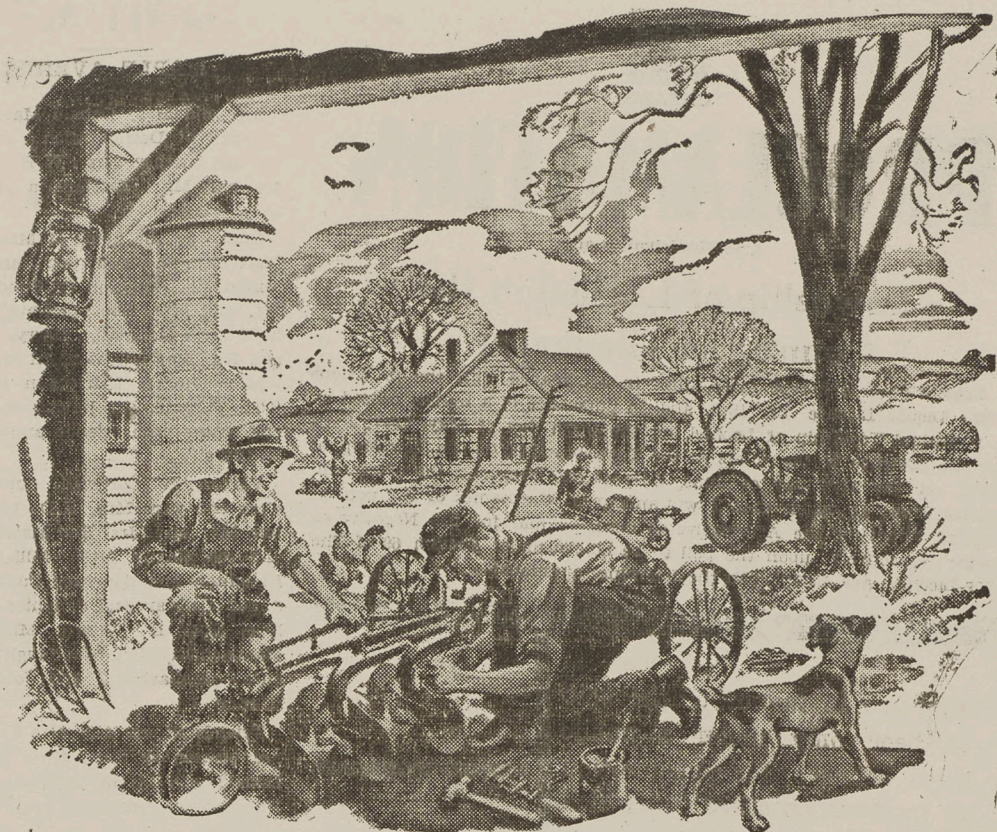

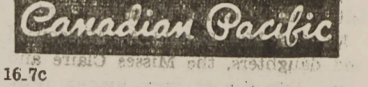

FISH FARMERS FERTILIZE INLAND SEA



THE MASS PRODUCTION OF fish is not an idle dream. It has been done by scientists in Scotland's Loch Craiglin, dammed off to make a seawater "tank." Fish find their food in the upper layers of water. By fertilizing the water, the British scientists found that the quality of fish food improved, and, consequently, the size of the fish—some of them growing twice as fast.

Picture here are two stages in fish farming. Top: Fertilizers, nitrates and phosphates, are poured into the inland sea. The boat's churning propeller ensures even distribution. Left: Researcher examines a sample of seawater through a microscope. The British experiments are being continued in the hope that through them, more food will be provided for the bare tables of war-torn Europe.
