GLENGARRY-PRESCOTT TO BE NEW FEDERAL RIDING

End of Glengarry As Separate Entity Seen In Redistribution

Amalgamation of Two Counties For Voting Purposes Recommended To House Of Commons By Ontario Group

The Eastern Ontario triangle now comprising the counties of Glengarry and Prescott will be combined to form the single Federal riding of Glengarry-Prescott, it was agreed by the Commons redistribution committee Thursday of last week.

Glengarry is now represented in the Commons by W. J. Major, and Prescott by Raymond Bruneau, both Liberals. Glengarry was the last seat held by the late Prime Minister Mackenzie King after his defeat in Prince Albert in the general Federal elections of 1945.

The Ontario sub-committee on redistribution decided that the constituencies of Ottawa East, Stormont, Russell and Leeds would be left unchanged.

The committee, studying a readjustment of representation in the Commons on the basis of the 1951 census, recommended that new seats be established in Hamilton and Welland constituencies.

Recommendations of the committee, which accepted a report on 31 of the 85 seats Ontario will have in the next Parliament, are subject to approval by the Commons.

D. D. MacSweyn Paid Final Tribute

The death occurred on Sunday evening, June 15th, 1952, of Duncan Donald MacSweyn at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fergus McRae and Mr. McRae, Laggan.

Mr. MacSweyn was born March 26th, 1871, on Lot 11-9th Kenyon, a son of the late John MacSweyn and his wife, Isabella MacLeod. In 1901 he moved to Lot 9-9th Kenyon, where he lived until about a year ago when, due to ill health, he left to reside with his daughter.

He was married on November 20th, 1901, to Miss Christy Grant of Laggan, who predeceased him in December, 1936, as did a son, Urquhart, in 1921, and a daughter, Mary E., in 1939.

Left to mourn his passing are three sons, John G., Norman J. and Donald D., and four daughters, (Isabel) Mrs. Fergus McRae; (Flora) Mrs. Clifford Campbell; (Sarah) Mrs. Lloyd MacMillan; (Christena) Mrs. Dougal MacGillivray. Four sisters, Mrs. D. D. MacLeod, Mrs. D. W. MacLeod, Mrs. Hugh MacMillan and Mrs. Fred N. MacCrimmon, also survive.

Mr. MacSweyn was of a cheerful disposition and a Gaelic greeting was always on his lips. As a young man he was presenter at church services and delighted in singing the Gaelic psalms.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday, June 18th, in Kirk Hill United Church, of which he was a member. Rev. Dr. D. N. MacMillan of Dunvegan Presbyterian Church, conducted the services, assisted by Rev. J. Maxwell Allan of Morrisburg. Favourite hymns of the deceased were sung, including "I Waited for the Lord My God" and "He Leadeth Me". Mr. Duncan M. MacGillivray sang the 103rd Psalm in Gaelic. Burial was in the adjoining cemetery.

The pallbearers were Donald H. MacIntosh, John P. MacLeod, Alexander MacLeod, Neil F. MacCrimmon, James G. MacCrimmon and Angus Gray.

The many friends and relatives attending the funeral services and the beautiful floral tributes and messages of sympathy received were silent testimonials to the esteem in which Mr. MacSweyn was held.

Farmers in Glengarry may see a small plane flying low over their homes sometime over this week-end. Don't worry about possible bombing or gunnery; it may be "shooting" your farm buildings with an aerial camera.

Twenty-six lucky farmers residing somewhere in the four townships are going to be so "shot" and in the next six months a picture of one of the farms will appear in the News each week. On proper identification of his farm, the owner or tenant will receive a framed picture of it plus dollar gift certificates from each of the merchants or other businessmen who are co-operating and whose advertisements will appear on the page each week.

Ayrshire entries were somewhat lower than last year. Senior and grand champion male was the winning aged bull, Glengarry Frank, shown by Neil Sangster, of Lancaster, while the senior and grand female awards went to Bruce Bros., of Spencerville, on Bruceburn Bell.

Cumming Bros., of Lancaster, had the junior champion bull with the winning junior calf, Glengarry Captain Carlson, and Sangster, the reserve with Strathburn Andy. Reserve senior and reserve grand male for R. W. McIlwain, of Vankleek Hill, was Macdonald Bright Light.

The junior champion female honors went to Cumming on their reserve champion at Lachute, Glengarry Jenny Lind, while McIlwain's top junior yearling, Glengarry Dora, was reserve. McIlwain had the reserve senior and reserve grand with Glengarry Scholar's Cherry, the top aged dry cow.

James Nixon of Vankleek Hill, and Donald Angus MacLennan, Dalketh, were top men in the Junior Department, greatly expanded this year in keeping with the Class "B" rating of the Fair. A tractor driving contest was a feature won by Nixon.

A colorful spot, in addition to the midway section, was the dance platform, where local preliminaries in dancing classes for the August 2nd Highland Games were run off on Saturday.

Harness racing was a feature both days with many fine horses offering excellent competition on the track. Notable in the fine showhall displays were the showwork and other exhibits from district schools.

WATCH YOUR STEP

July and August, the popular holiday months in Canada, will bring added hazard on our streets and highways. During the summer months use of Ontario's roads and highways multiplies as the province's nearly 1½ million drivers share the road with a large influx of visiting vacationers. Holiday week-ends are particularly bad travel times as the toll of motor casualties inevitably shows. Dominion Day carries an additional hazard falling as it does so close to the July 4th Independence Day holiday which brings so many U.S. visitors onto our roads. Last year, 90 people met death on Ontario highways during July.

In its safety program to cut down the Ontario accident rate, the provincial highways' department has issued a booklet, "Watch Your Step", aimed particularly at school children, but worthy of consideration by adults too. Spelled out for all to ponder are the following safety hints for pedestrians:

WAIT at the curb until you are sure you can cross the street safely.

ALWAYS look left, then right before starting across the street.

THE motorist has difficulty seeing you when you walk on the road after dark. Take extra care.

CCROSS intersections at right angles — not diagonally.

HAVE fun, but play in safe places.

YOU should keep your mind on the traffic when crossing the street.

OBEY all traffic signs and signals.

UMBRELLAS should not be held so that your vision is blocked.

REMEMBER, never follow a ball onto the street without first making sure the way is clear.

SLEIGH riding on streets is unsafe.

TRAFFIC lights protect you. Cross only on the green signal.

ELDERLY people and young children should be helped across busy streets.

POLICEMEN will help you cross the street safely... obey them.

WEAR or carry something white when walking on the road at night.

ALWAYS walk facing on-coming traffic if there is no sidewalk.

LOOK out for cars turning corners.

KEEP away from parked vehicles when you are playing.

STEPPING into traffic lanes from behind or in front of parked vehicles is dangerous.

ALWAYS walk to and from school by the safest route.

FOR your own safety — never jump on or off moving vehicles.

EXTRA care is needed when crossing wet or slippery streets. Cars take longer to stop.

LOOK out for traffic before entering or leaving a street car or bus.

YOU can't be too careful. Watch your step!

THOUGH OUR VOICE BE BUT A WHISPER

It was inevitable, it certainly wasn't unexpected, but a lot of Glengarry people, and former residents, too, must have been saddened to hear that as a political entity Glengarry will be no more. It won't be final until the Commons has approved the recommendations of the redistribution committee, but that approval is usually only a matter of form. It can be taken for granted that in next year's general election Glengarry-Prescott will send but one representative to Ottawa.

The change will involve reorganization of the political machines to embrace the new constituency and it can be expected that there will be some jockeying if all elements of the two counties are to be represented in the organizations to their satisfaction. The selection of standard-bearers for the two parties in next year's election may have its difficulties during this formative period.

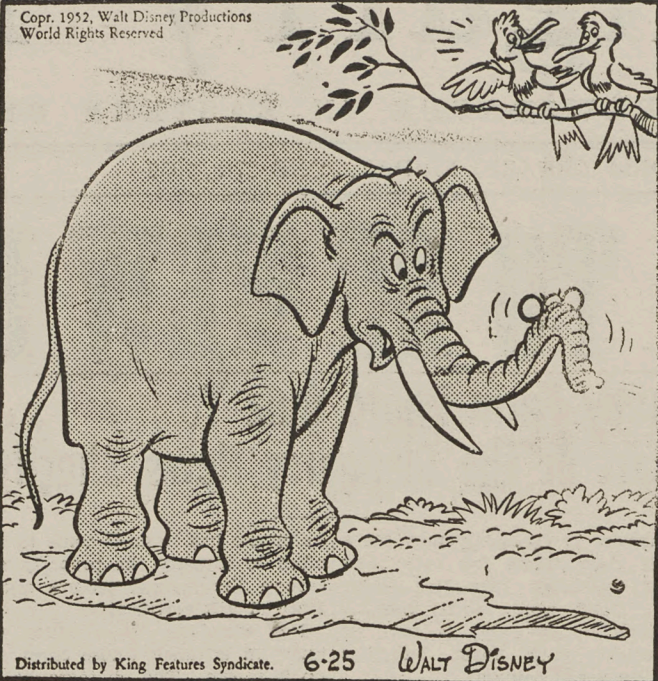
In its early days, Glengarry wielded an influence on both the provincial and national levels much greater than its size and population might have warranted. The same pioneer spirit which brought the Loyalists and their clansmen from Scotland to a new life in Canada was exemplified in their Glengarry descendants—who played prominent roles in every phase of the development of the country. Glengarry produced a premier of Upper Canada and Ontario, more than one provincial lieutenant-governor. In the fields of exploration, the opening and settling of new territory, Glengarry men have been in the forefront; men and women from this county have held responsible posts in the administrative field, the judicial, in every profession and walk of Canadian life.

Today, Glengarry doesn't throw as much weight. The picture is changed. In this machine age we have seen a transformation in our way of living, a rapid industrialization which has concentrated the big proportion of our people in a few large cities, has steadily depleted the rural population. This has brought a gradual change in the make-up of the House of Commons until today few of the constituencies of Eastern Canada can be said to be rural. Glengarry and Prescott, two such, were among the smallest in point of population and it was inevitable that one would have to go.

Our dislike of the change is a natural one that should not

In Scotland there are three Memorials to Flora Macdonald at Kilmuir and Portree in Skye and at Inverness on the mainland, but there is none in her native Isle, South Uist. Before the 1939 War there was a proposal to repair this omission, but events forestalled the completion of the project, which has remained in abeyance since then. The Clan Donald Societies in Scotland have now undertaken to place the walls of Flora Macdonald's house at Milton, South Uist, in a state of preservation, and to erect within the walls a Commemorative Cairn bearing a suitable inscription.

Flora Macdonald was born in 1722 at Milton and lived in the house, whose remains are to be preserved, from her early childhood until 1745 when she went to Armadale, Skye. Her birthplace was another house nearby of which there is now no trace.

Through her father Flora Macdonald derived her descent from the Chiefs of Clanranald and from the House of Dunyveg in Kintyre, and on her mother's side she was descended from the Chiefs of Sleat. She was thus a true daughter of the great Clan Donald founded by the mighty Somerled who in 1156 drove the Norsemen out of the Western Isles and became Rex Insularum, holding sway from the Butt of Lewis to the Isle of Man. Flora was the youngest child of Ranald Macdonald of Balivanich in Benbecula and of Milton in South Uist, and his wife Marion, daughter of the Rev. Angus Macdonald of the family of Griminish in North Uist. Her father died when she was about a year old. Hugh Macdonald of Armadale, Skye, married her mother in 1728, and settled down at Milton where the family lived until 1745. In that year Flora accompanied her mother and step-father to Armadale in Sleat, Skye, but in June, 1746, she returned to Milton to visit her brother, Angus, who had just taken over Balivanich and Milton. It was during the next few weeks that her courage and fidelity earned for her an imperishable place among the heroines of history.

Prince Charles Edward Stuart, a fugitive from the forces of the King, left the shores of South Uist disguised as Betty Burke, an Irish maid, accompanying Flora Macdonald who was returning to Skye. They set out on the evening of 28th June, and on the afternoon of the following day landed safely at Kilbride on the east coast of Loch Snizort, and the western shore of Trotternish, Skye, whence the Prince, after further adventures, escaped to France.

The remains of the house at Milton stand on a green knoll on the west side of the road from Lochboisdale to Benbecula, overlooking Loch Kildonan. The outline of the house is clearly marked by the original foundation stones, all rough and unwhewn boulders skilfully built together without mortar. Many of the upper stories lie in profusion inside and outside the line of the walls. The house is in the shape of the capital letter 'L', the longer arm running east and west, and the shorter north and south.

On 30th October, 1934, the ruins were scheduled as an Ancient Monument under the Ancient Monuments Act, 1931. One of the consequences of this is that the permission of the Minister of Works is required before any alteration can be made to the ruins as they stand. Permission has been granted to carry out the work proposed.

It is proposed to build up the existing walls to a height of 3½ to 4 feet, the building being done in the old style, and to erect within them at the corner of the 'L' a Cairn about 10 feet high on which will be placed a Bronze Plaque bearing the inscription.

We feel that this work of stone and bronze is necessary, but it is not in itself a sufficient memorial to the Clan's Heroine. We have considered how best to keep alive the memory of Flora Macdonald among the people of her native Uist, and have decided that the presentation of Flora Macdonald prizes in the Schools of North and South Uist and Benbecula would be appropriate. Successive generations of school children will thus have their thoughts directed to the virtues of courage and fidelity so nobly exemplified by Flora Macdonald.

It has also been suggested that, if funds permit, Flora Macdonald prizes might be awarded annually to the successful competitors in the playing of the bagpipes which is traditionally associated with South Uist.

It is hoped that the Memorial at Milton may be completed and inaugurated before the end of this year.

On the cairn it is proposed to inscribe, both in Gaelic and English, the following:

"AIR MUIR 'S AIR TÌR"

Clan Donald raised this cairn of remembrance to their kinswoman

FLORA MACDONALD

daughter of Ranald, son of Angus of Milton, South Uist. She was born in 1722 near this place and spent her early life in the house that stood on this foundation. When pursuit was drawing near to the Prince in the long island she greatly aided him by her heroism and endurance to gain shelter in the Isle of Skye.

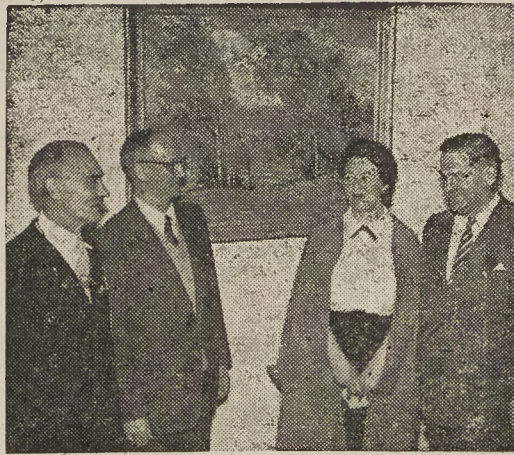

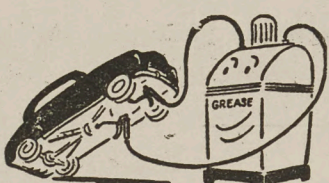
