Elections Slated For Monday In Alexandria Kenyon And Charlottenburgh Townships

Lancaster Township and Village Acclaim New Reeves As Present Incumbents Retire—One New Councillor in Lochiel, Maxville

Voters in Alexandria, Kenyon and Charlottenburgh go to the polls next Monday as municipal elections again hold the spotlight. There will be no elections in the four other Glengarry municipalities although one new face will appear at the council board in each case.

Last minute qualifications Thursday night at Alexandria necessitated elections for Council, P.U.C. and Separate School Trustee in this town. Seven are seeking the six council seats; four are in the fight for two Commission vacancies, and there is a battle for trustee in the south ward.

In Kenyon, Deputy-Reeve Hugh Raymond, Apple Hill, is contesting the reeveship now held by D. D. MacKinnon, Dunvegan. Allan Vallance, Dominionville, is acclaimed as deputy-reeve, and four are seeking the three council seats, present incumbents Dan Flaro and D. A. Gray, as well as John F. McCrimmon, Dunvegan, and Albert J. McIntyre, Apple Hill.

There will be contests at all three levels in Charlottenburgh. Reeve John McLennan is being challenged by Cormic Macdonell, Green Valley, deputy-reeve in 1951, and who lost by a narrow margin in last year's voting. Deputy-Reeve D. K. MacDougald and Councillor Percy Laplante of Summerstown, are contesting the second-rung post, and five are in the race for the three council seats. They are Councillors Stewart McKay, Martintown, and William MacDonell, Apple Hill, and three newcomers, Bryce MacNaughton, Martintown; Richard Lunny, Glen Roy, and Charles W. Craig, East Front.

Warden T. Scott Fraser made good his announcement that he would retire from political life, and as a result Lancaster Township has a new reeve, Josephus Filion, Green Valley, who formerly served as councillor and deputy-reeve. Other members of council were acclaimed: Duncan A. Condie, deputy-reeve; Gilbert Gauthier, J. D. A. Macdonald and Louis Samson, councillors.

The same situation developed in Lancaster Village, where James A. McArthur, veteran reeve and a former warden, retired. New to municipal politics, James A. Trickey was given an acclamation as reeve, and the present councillors were returned: Stewart MacGillis, Lucien Ledue, A. J. Legault and Albert Seguin. Mr. Trickey is a native of the East Front and a former commercial traveller who retired some three years ago when he came to reside in Lancaster.

(A report carried in the daily press to the effect Friday's nomination proceedings at Lancaster had been postponed owing to the illness of Reeve McArthur, was without foundation in fact. Mr. McArthur was not able to be present, but nominations were carried out as scheduled.)

There is only one change in the Lochiel council, where Councillor Michael McCormick has withdrawn and Alfred Choquette, Gore, will replace him. Reeve J. W. MacLeod, Deputy-Reeve Hugh Macdonald, and Councillors Roy MacMillan and Eugene Ranger are the members returning to office.

A new councillor will also take the oath of office in Maxville Village, where Reeve W. A. MacEwen and Councillors J. N. Fitzgerald, Rene Beaulieu and Wilfred Doh are returned. C. G. McKillop has withdrawn his nomination as councillor and he will be replaced by A. R. Stewart.

Voting Monday in Alexandria, Kenyon and Charlottenburgh will be from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Tells Of Canadian Ship's Call At Uruguay

Porto Alegre 2620, Montevideo, Uruguay, November 7th, 1952.

Dear Mr. Macdonald: The Canadian Navy's cruiser "Ontario", recently called at Montevideo, Uruguay, as part of a South American, good-will and training tour, and their stay here was so warmly received by the Uruguayan people, that I feel urged to tell you and the Glengarry News' readers about it.

The Ontario, which is the Canadian Navy's second largest battleship, has at present a complement of seven hundred officers and men and is commanded by Captain E. P. Tisdall. It arrived here October 29th from Buenos Aires and hoisted anchor from here on November 2nd.

Power Interruption Set For Sunday

A power interruption is planned by Hydro on Sunday, from 1.15 to 4 p.m., on the Martintown rural area, which encompasses practically all Glengarry.

The interruption is made necessary here while two new substations are being connected up. Other repairs to lines in the area will be completed at the same time.

For the past month special Hydro crews have been here installing a larger sub-station lay-out on Elgin street and a second one just west of town to serve the Alexandria rural area. A steel structure will replace the wooden one here and a 2,000 kilowatt transformer will replace the present 600 kilowatt one. The greater voltage will provide necessary capacity for future increases in consumption of power and may also give more satisfactory service.

The three 667 KVA transformers being placed at the rural substation will treble the power potential on that circuit to allow for additional rural consumers and lines.

T. D. Dillon, electrical foreman of the Ottawa area, is in charge of the work.

In announcing the postponement, Reeve McArthur said advance notice of the referendum did not comply with the law governing such a vote. At least one month's notice is required before the vote can be taken.

Play Is Highlight Of Annual Concert

At the St. Andrew's Concert in Alexander Hall, Friday, Saturday and Monday nights—see the dramatic portrayal of an episode in the life and trials of Bonnie Prince Charles in his efforts to regain the throne of Scotland.

The intrigues of would-be spies and traitors endeavoring to quell the rising of loyal followers in the Stuart cause.

The play is but one of the features of the big annual concert. There will be Gaelic singing by Dougald MacFarlane of Cape Breton of the big annual concert, group Highland dancing, the violins and songsters followed by dancing.

J. J. Dixon Maxville Passes

Widely known as a Notary Public in Maxville over the past two decades, John James Dixon died at his home there, Thursday morning, November 20th, after a prolonged illness. He was in his 76th year.

The late Mr. Dixon was born at Pendleton, March 11th, 1877, a son of George Dixon and his wife, Margaret Wilkinson. He attended school at Pendleton, and later learned the trade of cheesemaking, an occupation he followed until his removal to Maxville, 25 years ago. There he was the town's Notary Public for many years. He was a member of the United Church.

Mr. Dixon was twice married, in 1898 to Florence Maud Muir, who predeceased him in 1920, and in 1923 to Winnifred MacQueen, who survives. Also surviving are seven children of his first marriage: Mrs. Bruce Johnson (Muriel) of Pendleton; Mrs. Phill Allard (Ruth), Sarasota, Florida; Mrs. Elie Chenier (Frances), Alexandria; Mrs. Malcolm Deachman (Florence), Ottawa; Wallace of Pendleton; Clarence of Ottawa, and Lawrence Dixon, Mountain; and two children of his second marriage: Mrs. Peter LeGallais (Mary Margaret) of Winnipeg, and George Dixon, at home.

The funeral was held from his late home at 1 o'clock, Saturday afternoon, to the United Church, where Rev. J. H. Hamilton conducted the service and spoke very fittingly of one who during his lifetime faithfully attended his church.

The pallbearers were: James Dixon, Jr., Stanley MacDonald, Alex MacDonald, A. Brownell, John McQueen, Leonard Bradley.

Burial was in the family plot at Westminster cemetery near Pendleton.

The large attendance at the funeral and beautiful flowers were a tribute to his memory.

Sister St. Brigid Dies At St. Laurent

Sister Mary of St. Brigid (Margaret Ann Ellis) died in her eighty-fifth year, the morning of November 20th, in the infirmary of the Mother House of the Sisters of Holy Cross, at St. Laurent, Que., where she had been in failing health the past two years.

The Requiem Mass of the funeral service was offered Saturday morning, November 22nd, by the Chaplain of the Convent, Rev. J. A. Pouliot, C.S.C. Present in the sanctuary was a grand nephew of the deceased, Rev. James MacCormick of the Ottawa Seminary; Rev. D. F. MacDonald, Pastor of Our Lady of Fatima Church, St. Laurent, and Rev. E. Daoust, C.S.C., assistant Chaplain of the Mother House.

Among the immediate relatives in attendance were three nephews, Mr. Thomas Kane and Messrs. James and O'Neil MacCormick, all of Montreal. Mrs. Thomas Kane, the only surviving member of the Ellis family, was unable to be present. Sisters from the convents in Renfrew, Ottawa, Alexandria and St. Gabriel's, Montreal, with the Mother House Community, made up the funeral cortege to the community cemetery.

The deceased counted sixty-seven years of religious life. She was the first Sister to enter the Holy Cross Order from her native parish, St. Gabriel's, Montreal. She celebrated the Golden Jubilee of her religious profession in July, 1939, and her Ruby Jubilee in 1949. Many houses of the Order knew Sister in her long career as religious. She exercised the office of authority as Superior from the year 1905, when she was named Local Superior of Renfrew, Ontario. In 1911 she was sent to St. Scholastique, Que., and later to several missions in the New England States, among them Newmarket, Springfield and St. Albans. The English houses of the Order in Canada: St. Gabriel's, Montreal, Alexandria, Renfrew and Ottawa in Ontario, all profited of her wise, capable and kind government.

Sister Mary of St. Brigid's name will also be recalled by the many piano and violin students who owed their success in musical culture to the efficient teaching that emanated from her artistic soul.

Dunlop, Minister of Education, told students of Alexandria High School in an address at the annual Commencement Exercises, Wednesday afternoon. Hon. Dr. Dunlop was addressing a capacity audience of pupils, parents and friends in Alexander Hall, but he addressed his remarks almost exclusively to the teen-agers. There was food for thought for adults, too.

The Minister also presented graduation diplomas and certificates, always a highlight of the Exercises. He also spoke at Maxville High Commencement that night.

Interspersing his more serious remarks with humorous stories which he recounted most effectively, Hon. Dr. Dunlop dwelt on three fundamentals in education. The student must work hard if he is to get along, though he or she should enjoy school days, too; he must take all the subjects in the curriculum and should have a certain objective, even though that may change from time to time.

Don't leave Alexandria High School until you have absorbed all it has to offer, warned Dr. Dunlop, who deplored the tendency to drop subjects and to stop schooling before Grade XIII had been completed. There is going to be plenty of room in Grade XIII, he declared, reminding the students that these subjects are required in the professions.

A former teacher in all types of schools including teachers' colleges, Dr. Dunlop put in a plug for the teaching profession. "What a good profession teaching is", he declared, in pointing out there was room for a thousand more teachers every year to take care of Ontario's expanding school population. He dwelt briefly with plans of his department for the new Teachers' Colleges which will supplant the present Normal Schools.

There are two classes of people in Dr. Dunlop's view. One group monkeys around, is inclined to drift. The others are the planners who enjoy life but work hard and never forget where they are going. They are the good citizens, he thought.

C. Campbell Fraser, vice-principal of A.H.S., was chairman, and he called on Osie Villeneuve, M.P.P., to introduce the Minister. Today sees the greatest expansion in education the department has ever known, said Mr. Villeneuve, and it is fortunate that we have at its head a man so well qualified to know the problems through years of actual experience.

In expressing the thanks of the Board of Trustees to Hon. Dr. Dunlop, Dr. D. J. Dolan reviewed briefly the long, difficult struggle for a new school now in sight. A new 400-pupil school is now being planned by the architect, the site has been selected, financing is being arranged and the new school should be in actual operation next September, Dr. Dolan promised. With adequate facilities, it should be easier to hold the pupil in school until the full course has been completed, making for better citizens with more promising futures.

Miss Claire Marcoux, who later was to receive her honor graduation diploma, delivered the address of welcome in two languages. There were musical numbers by pupils of Grades 9-C and 9-E, directed by Miss Catherine MacRae; duets by Adrien Chalot and Robert Lemieux; a puppet show staged by Audrey Johnson, and piano solos by Claire Theoret.

DO WE NEED DUAL ADMINISTRATION?

Two new members are to be elected to the Public Utilities Commission in Alexandria's voting, next Monday. One of the important questions the new Commission may be called on to review is the recent action in hiring a P.U.C. secretary-manager whose duties would be separate entirely from those of the clerk-treasurer.

It will be recalled that P. A. Charlebois, present town clerk, was hired as secretary of the P.U.C. at a recent meeting. It was made conditional, we understand, that he could not fill simultaneously the duties of town clerk, and his salary was fixed at \$60 per week, more than he is presently receiving in his dual role. The motion passed despite the objections of Mayor Simon, on a 3-2 vote of the Commission.

Mayor Simon felt that it was not proper for retiring members of the Commission to try and tie the hands of the incoming Board, especially when the appointment was not to be effective until the New Year. He also objected on the grounds of cost. One secretary should be able to handle both jobs, given greater privacy in the new administration building, he felt, and there was no need for a duplication of jobs and salaries which would double the burden on the ratepayers.

With his arguments we agree. Alexandria has not grown to the point where we need duplication of services with such a resulting increase in administrative costs. One efficient secretary, with capable assistance, should be able to handle both posts.

It might be well for our electors to ascertain the thinking of P.U.C. candidates on this matter before making their choice at the polls.

BE INDEPENDENT; WALK IF YOU MUST

One aspect of municipal elections which we have never quite been able to understand is the now established practice of candidates hiring cars to convey the voters to the polls. Another election-day dodge which has been more recently introduced is this business of supplying a baby sitter while the woman of the house is being driven to the poll.

They are being practised, too, locally, in provincial and federal elections and are beginning to assume the proportions of a racket.

Election funds in the larger fields may be able to provide these luxuries but they should be, nonetheless, completely unnecessary and they are undemocratic. These election purses are not provided without strings and we have an idea our form of government would be much more fair to the little fellow if there was not the need for parties collecting these big campaign "contributions".

But in the municipal field, where the candidate is running at his own expense and without expectation of stipend if elected, it is just plain silly to see him forking out ten or fifteen dollars for a car, or possibly double that amount for two cars.

It has become the thing to do and many candidates will be doing it Monday, even though it goes against their grain. The personal outlay expected of a candidate for office these days may be an important reason for the obvious reluctance of many good citizens to enter public life.

You and I might do much to stamp out this one weakness in our election picture by refusing to use the conveyance offered by candidates. Particularly in a town the size of Alexandria, there are few excepting the lame and the ill who could not walk to the polls without sacrifice.

By accepting that ride you may not necessarily be curtailing your freedom to vote as you choose. But you are encouraging an election practice that is unhealthy and can lead to abuse of our democratic form of majority rule.

Don't be a hitch-hiker.

MR. COLDWELL'S PLAN FOR NATIONAL HEALTH

Just when we had begun to relax in the confidence that federal authorities had at least temporarily shelved their scheme for a national health plan, along comes C.C.F. Leader M. J. Coldwell with word that his party will circulate petitions asking the Dominion Government to establish such a plan. It worries us because other such socialistic thinking by the C.C.F. in the past has more than once become Liberal policy.

Mr. Coldwell wants a contributory system of hospital, medical, dental and optical care for everybody, free of charge, to be paid for by the Dominion Government, but to be administered by local authorities responsible to the provincial governments. The federal government would foot the bill for all illness and treatment, would provide money for hospitals and the expanded training of medical personnel and would have no control over the actual administration.

Even if our economy could bear the added costs of such a health plan, this feature alone would condemn it. To require one government to collect taxes for another government to spend is a bad principle of taxation. It encourages irresponsibility in the handling of the people's money and is bound to result in waste and extravagance. The recent Dominion-Provincial tax agreements did not appeal to us on that account.

The lowest estimate of the cost to the people of this proposed National Health plan is more than \$100 a year per family. This plan is to be paid for out of taxes and already the people are being taxed to death. Another \$100 a year piled on today's taxes would be anything but healthful.

If we are again to be told that the public demands a national health plan, let the public be warned in advance just how much extra taxes are to be imposed to finance it. If Mr. Coldwell and his C.C.F.ers plan to circulate petitions among the workmen of the country, we trust that figure of \$100 per family per year in more taxes to pay for the plan will be prominently displayed on the petitions. But we doubt it will.

The Reserve Army's Real Need

(Ottawa Journal)

Once more reorganization of the Reserve Army is being considered. The devoted men who give of their spare time to maintain reserve units must hear the news with apprehension. Reorganizations can do more harm than good unless they bring in a supply of recruits or arouse new enthusiasm. After seven years of experience with the postwar Reserve Army, all the obvious expedients have been attempted and the fact that it is undermanned is not the fault of either the senior army officers or the Reserve and volunteer officers and men.

The Reserve has two difficulties in obtaining more men — and men, not equipment, is its need. First, the veteran who saw service in World War I or II, or in Korea, deserves sympathy when he contends he has done his bit and feels little inclination to turn out once or twice a week for training, and abandon his summer holiday with his family to attend a military camp.

The second difficulty is in finding recruits among the younger men. Before World War I most youths were interested in military affairs. They saw the opportunity for companionship, rifle-shooting, wearing smart uniforms and adventure. But after that war there was an age of cynicism about military life and other attractions, the movies and automobiles among them, made volunteer service less popular. Today, there are more sources of civilian entertainment than ever before. Youths reaching manhood very often never give voluntary military training a thought.

What the Reserve Army requires is not another report, or a reorganization, but the support it should have from the Dominion Government. Compulsory full-time service, such as that imposed on their youth by our allies in NATO, causes a shudder when mentioned within earshot of the present administration. If Mr. Claxton and his Cabinet friends could only force themselves to face facts they might come to the conclusion that requiring a youth to turn out one or two nights a week, and going to camp for a couple of weeks in the summer, would be accepted as good sense by all who feel for the security of this country.

The Reserve Army now exists because of voluntary effort. It is counted an essential part of our defence at a time when we must be on the alert. To make part-time training compulsory would make the Reserve as powerful as it should be and still demand a good deal less of our youth than other friendly nations require of their young men.

Be the only customer and you won't have to buy a license. Give your wife \$12.00 to buy a gallon of whiskey. There are 128 snorts in a gallon. Buy all your drinks from your wife at 40c a snort and in four days when the gallon is done, your wife will have \$39.20 to put in the bank and will also have \$12.00 to start up in business again. If you live 10 years and continue to buy all your booze from your wife and then die with the snakes in your boots, your widow will have \$35,750.40 on deposit, enough to bury you respectably, bring up your children, buy a house and lot, marry a decent man and forget she ever knew you."

One Farmer Gets Twice As Much

(The Rural Scene)

Two young farmers living two hundred and fifty miles apart in Ontario produce milk under similar conditions of production. The cost of production in each case would be about that of the other. One sells milk at the basic rate of \$2.40 per hundred pounds; the other at \$4.80.

The \$4.80 price is the rate paid for whole milk to be retailed to consumers at prices fixed by the Milk Control Board. It is paid only for that portion of the milk offered that the dairy will accept from the farmer from time to time. The milk that the dairy will not accept is separated by the farmer and the cream is shipped to a creamery for the manufacture of butter, ice cream and other products.

Obviously the result of milk price control is that neither producers nor consumers as a whole benefit from this interference with milk marketing.

It is clear to the most competent economists who have studied this problem that the best interests of both producers and consumers would be served by a voluntary co-operative milk pool which would accept whole milk produced under health regulations.

Truth of the matter is stated by Mr. Eric Hoffer, in his important study of revolutionary movements.

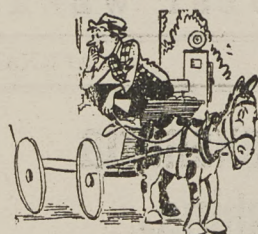
Long Road

Buenos Aires in Argentina and Montevideo in Uruguay. From here they headed for Rio De Janeiro in Brazil, from whence they would visit Trinidad, pass through the Panama Canal and thence to Victoria, B.C., hoping to arrive there shortly before Christmas.

I understand that the Canadian Navy has a policy of making a good-will and training tour of South America about every five years. After seeing the impression that the Ontario's personnel made here, I strongly commend this policy, which not only gives valuable training to the whole crew, but also acquaints the South American peoples favorably with Canada. In addition, of course, stems added prestige for Canada and indirect benefits such as additional trade. I might add that in my limited travelling in South American countries, I have always noted a marked respect for Canada.

The Ontario's personnel were entertained at many formal and informal social functions by the Uruguayan people, Americans, English, and we few Canadians here, and they seemed to enjoy their short stay. Since there is no Canadian embassy here, the British embassy helped arrange the diplomatic duties. The commander of the Ontario laid a wreath of flowers at the monument of the Uruguayan National hero, Artigas. This action, of course, was highly appreciated by the Uruguayan people. Representatives of the Uruguayan government visited the Ontario.

As the Ontario was shoving off, their band first played Auld Lang Syne, which was quite appropriate. Then they played the Uruguayan National Anthem, and at this point the thousands of Uruguayans who were watching the Ontario's departure, went wild with enthusiasm. This piece of music is considered very difficult to play, but the Ontario's band accomplished it very well.

I think I am voicing the sentiments of the Uruguayan people and all the other nationalities here when I say: "Come back Ontario."

And now if I may divert to another subject, I should like to congratulate you as editor of The Glengarry News for the nation-wide and well-deserved recognition you recently received on your fine editorial page. I always look forward to receiving The Glengarry News and am disappointed when any copies fail to survive the six thousand-mile journey here. My wife, although not a Glengarryian, enjoys reading it also.

What I intended to be a short note, has expanded beyond my target, so now a halt, and a very Merry Christmas to you all.

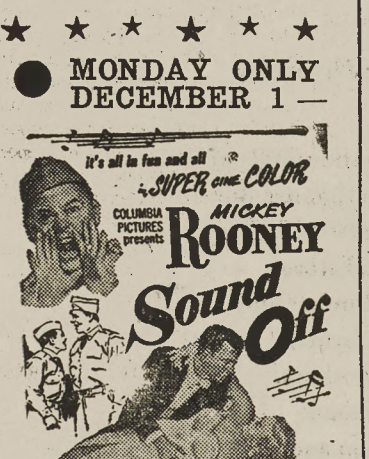

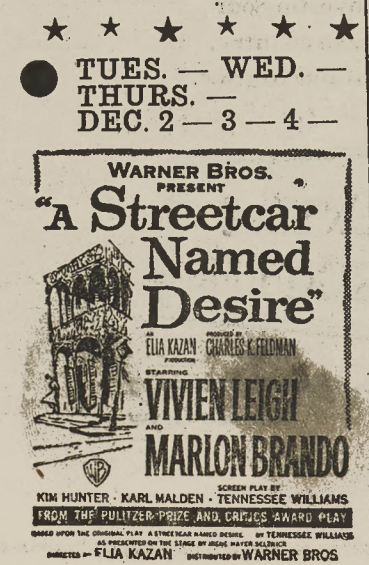

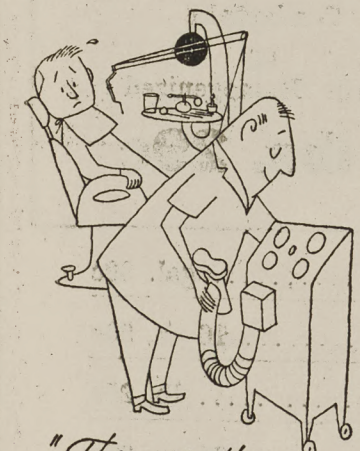
Mrs. Duncan McLean Heads Women's Guild

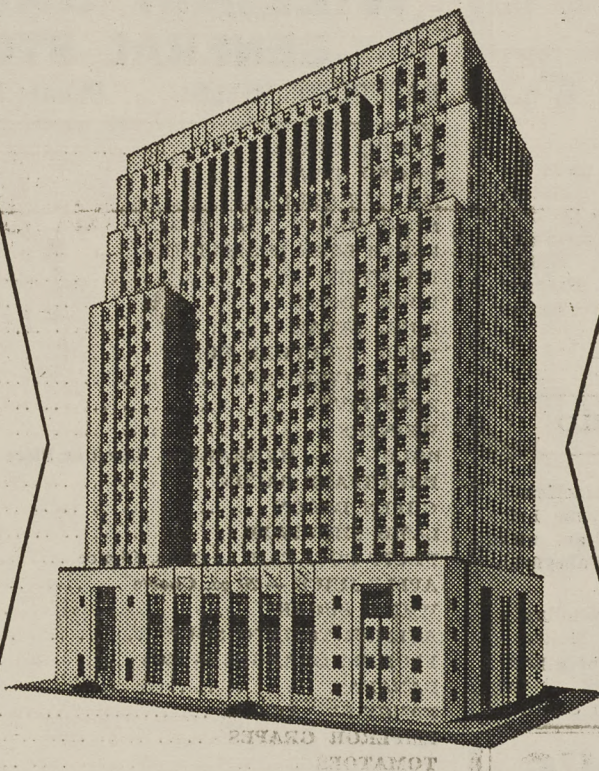

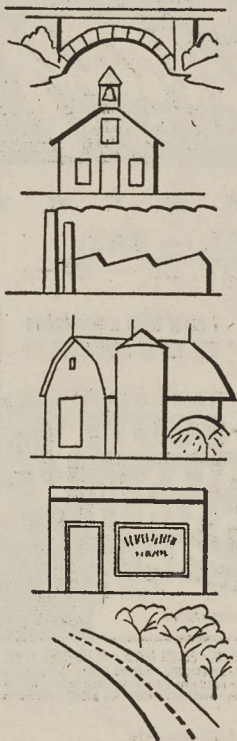

The Montreal egg market continues unsettled and dealers are moving cautiously. The current supply has increased, but only for immediate trade needs are purchases being made. In small lots to retailers, cartons have been holding steady, but on open wholesale transactions and in large retail outlets prices are easier. Bids on the Commodity Exchange were down 3 cents.

Receipts on Friday totalled 318 cases against 317 a year ago.

On Maritime potatoes, prices have been cut as much as 10 cents, but Quebec stock remains steady at recent drop.

All-Eastern Holsteins Sale Averages \$849; Local Breeders Take Part

The tenth annual All-Eastern Ontario Holstein Sale held November 5th at the Coliseum, Ottawa, realized a total of \$16,080 on the sale of 46 head for a general average of \$349. Interest was high and a good crowd was on hand. Last year's average, the highest in the series, was \$497.

Top price was \$800, paid by Glen-oden Farms, Vankleek Hill, to Fred H. Scott, Russell, for the four-year-old heifer Colantha Empress. Glen-oden Farms also paid the highest price for a bred heifer of \$675. This was for a heifer consigned by Lawrence Leadbeater & Son, Seely's Bay. Only six bulls were sold and these averaged \$228, with the top of \$275 paid by Cecil McBride, Cobden, to Allan R. Stewart, Lyn.

Howard Demoulin, Lancaster, bought two head, these including a bred heifer from Angus Smith, Chesterville, at \$350, and a bred heifer from Fred L. Carscadden, Russell, at \$265. Peter A. Munroe, Maxville, bought a bred heifer from Stewart W. Fisher at \$270, while F. C. McLennan, Lancaster, sold a bred heifer to Claude Young, Bristol, Que., at \$335.

Liberal MP Wants \$40 Pensions For All Blind

A Liberal member of the Commons, Friday, advocated payment of a \$40-a-month pension to all blind persons in Canada.

Norman C. Schneider, elected in a May 25th by-election to represent the Ontario constituency of Waterloo North, said the application of a means test to blind persons "is outdated and unfair".

The Federal Health Department estimates there are between 15,000 and 20,000 blind persons in Canada. Approximately 8,000 receive a pension on a means-test basis.

Under existing legislation, pensions of \$40 a month are paid to needy blind persons between the ages of 21 and 70. The pension is reduced if the total annual income of the single recipient exceeds \$840; and that of the married recipient \$1,320 a year.

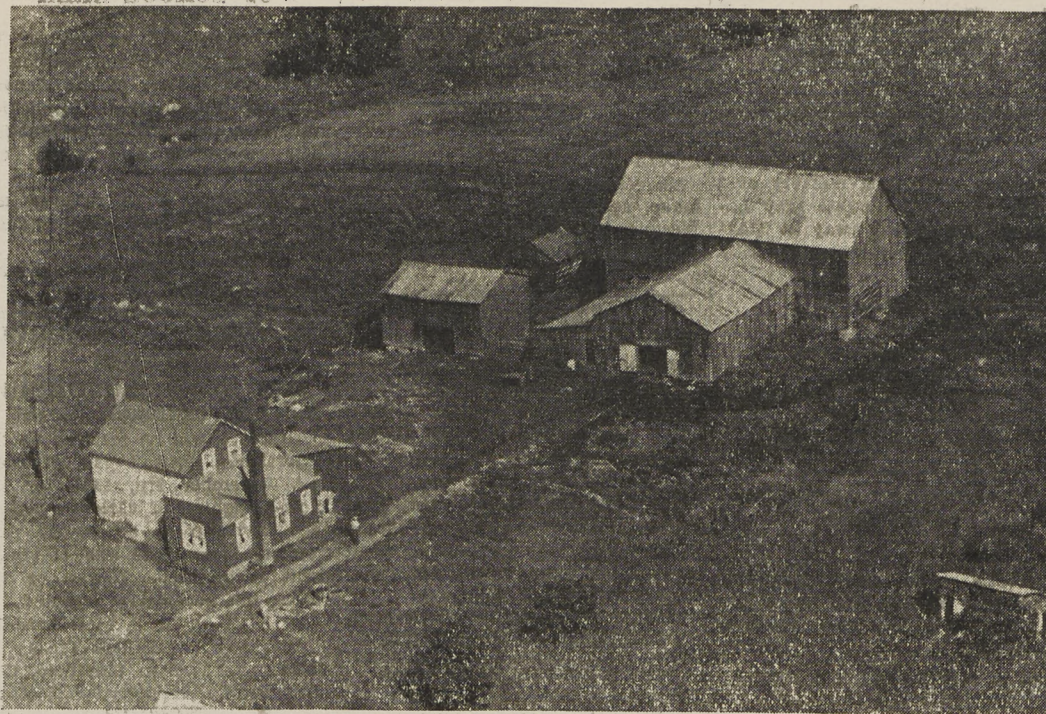
The Federal Government pays 75 percent of the cost of the pensions and the provinces the remainder.

Mr. Schneider said that blind persons 70 and over now qualify for the universal \$40-a-month pension regardless of means.

The application of the means test to other age groups merely discouraged the blind from helping themselves.

Mr. Schneider spoke in the Commons while seconding the traditional motion for adoption of an address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

The motion was moved by Joseph Deslauriers (L—Brome—Missisquoi), who said that Canadian forces serving with the United Nations in Korea are "protecting our freedom, constantly threatened by Communist aggression".

Cattle Disease Caused Huge Jump In Meat Production

Canada's meat production this year climbed by almost 200,000 pounds at a time when producers faced the bleakest market in years.

Foot-and-mouth disease in Western Canada was the main factor. It brought down the curtain on Canada's biggest export meat market — the United States. It forced domestic prices to tumble and brought on emergency Federal Government price props that may cost the taxpayer about \$30,000,000 this year.

An outline of problems that befell Canada as a result of foot-and-mouth outbreak, now ended, was contained in the 103-page Agriculture Department report that will backgroud the annual Federal-Provincial agricultural conference that opens here December 1st.

The department estimated that in the 12-month period ended September 30th last, meat production in Canada climbed to 1,550,000,000 pounds from 1,352,000,000 a year ago. The entire increase was in pork.

Pork increased to 891,000,000

pounds from 680,000,000. Beef slipped to 574,900,000 pounds from 588,500,000. Veal declined to 63,000,000 from 73,000,000.

While cattle marketings were light, hog marketings were "unusually heavy".

"The handling and disposal of surplus meat products created acute problems during the year."

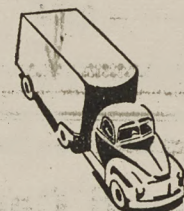

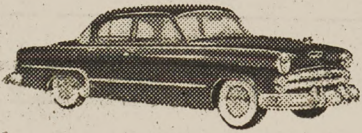
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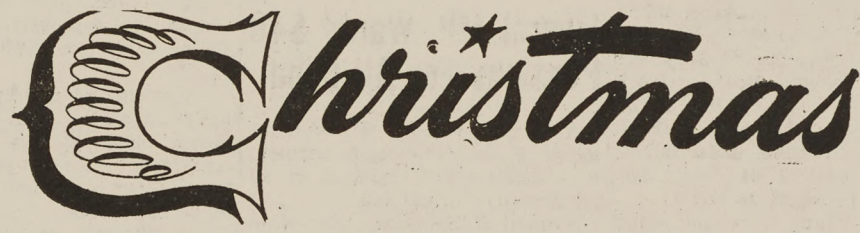
