

Glengarry Clan Donald Invited To Help Restore Scottish Glengarry Castle

Macdonalds, McDonalds, Macdonells, all members of Clan Donald, no matter the spelling their name, are being asked to contribute to a fund being raised in Scotland in an attempt to preserve the Castle of Invergarry from further decay.

The ruin, pictured at right, stands on the shores of Loch Oich and is all that is left of the stronghold of the Glengarry Macdonells. Originally it was a five-storey building with a sixth-storey tower. Much of it remains standing, but the masonry is loose and the object is to secure the ruins from further dilapidation and do as much repairing as the response to the appeal will permit.

The castle was built in the 17th century and was twice burned and restored. Prince Charles Edward stayed in it twice during the Rising of '45, and soon after the Battle of Culloden, in 1746, Cumberland's troops arrived and burned it. It has been a ruin ever since.

The Invergarry Castle fund committee is headed by Sheriff Hector MacKechnie, Q.C., of Inverness, and members several Macdonalds and McDonalds in its membership.

Major Angus McDonald, of Alexandria, has agreed to accept donations for forwarding to Scotland, and it has been suggested Glengarrians might consider giving one pound toward the cause. 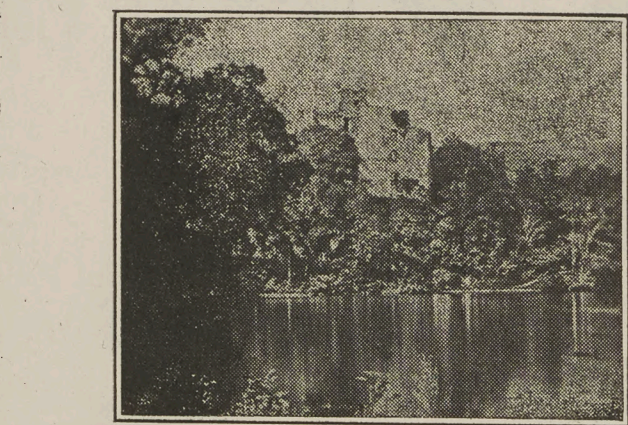

Received Word Son Drowned

Alan McDonald, 37, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat. R. McDonald, Alexandria, is believed to have been drowned this morning in the Espanola area.

Provincial Police advised the family early tonight that a Pulp and Paper Co. in that area had advised them of the accident which occurred at 10:30 this morning, Thursday.

There were no details and the family at press time was endeavoring to check the report.

Fell 52 Feet Not Badly Hurt

A 19-year-old worker on the St. Lawrence Seaway building at Cornwall fell 52 feet last Thursday, landed on a concrete base at the foot of an elevator shaft and escaped with minor injuries.

Lou Miller, Apple Hill, plasterer's helper, was working on a scaffold in the eight-storey building at 3:30 p.m. when he lost his balance and fell three and a half storeys.

He grabbed an elevator shaft railing which he fell against, and went head first over it down the elevator shaft.

Fellow workers report that the youth landed face down on the concrete shaft base but did not lose consciousness. They could not explain what might have saved the youth from almost certain death or serious injury.

Two-Year-Old Tot Killed Under Truck Driven By Uncle

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Laflamme, First Alexandria Traffic Victim In Three Years, Died Monday

Fatally injured when run over in the yard of his home, Main street south, by a truck driven by his uncle, Wayne Laflamme, 28-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Laflamme, died shortly after 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. Lawrence Laflamme, the grief-stricken uncle, had driven into the garage and had left the truck before he saw the crushed body of his nephew and realized an accident had occurred.

The left rear wheel of the heavy truck had passed over the child's chest and he survived only for some 20 minutes. The mishap occurred at 4 p.m.

The fatality was the first in three years in Alexandria. Maurice Dore, 8, was fatally injured July 3rd, 1954, when he ran in front of a car on Main street south.

Dr. D. J. Dolan was called to attend the child, but he succumbed 20 minutes later to injuries which included a crushed chest. Police Chief Ed. Dupuis investigated.

In addition to the parents, two sisters and one brother survive: Dianne, 6; Danielle, 5, and Brian, 4.

The body rested at Marcoux & Morris Funeral Home until Wednesday at 11 a.m., when the funeral was held to Sacred Heart Church and cemetery.

Two Cornwall Men In Custody Following Break-Ins At Maxville

Two Cornwall men are in custody following the Friday night break-in of two garages at Maxville, the theft of two cars, a police chase complete with gunfire.

Police said Armands Lapierre, 41, and Morris Walker, 27, were charged with breaking and entering.

Cst. S. E. Foster of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Maxville, stated that charges were laid Tuesday night against Armands Lapierre and Morris Walker, both of Cornwall, in connection with Maxville robberies Friday night. Both men are being detained in County Jail, Cornwall.

During a period of less than three hours last Friday night, two Maxville garages were entered, two cars were stolen and the calm of the quiet village was shattered by a dramatic race between Constable Foster in his police cruiser and the thieves in their stolen vehicle.

Constable Foster surprised the bold culprits while they were engaged in ransacking the offices of the George Greer garage. They dashed out a side door, jumped into their stolen car and careened down Carr street. The officer sped his cruiser parallel to them down Main street and pulled partially across the intersection of the two roads, just south of the CNR crossing. He jumped out of his cruiser and tried to stop them, but they shot their vehicle through the narrow space between the police cruiser and the curb, almost running down the offi-

cer in the process. Constable Foster reported that he had to jump clear in order to avoid injury from the careening vehicle.

He fired three shots at the tires of the stolen car but all missed. The car went out of control as the thieves rounded a curve in the north end of the village and they escaped on foot, stealing a second car and speeding away from the area.

The second stolen car, belonging to Donald Munro, who resides at the west end of the village, was later recovered some four miles north-east of Glen Robertson. It was undamaged.

A cash register stolen earlier in the evening was found Saturday in bush along a side road north and west of Maxville. It had been slightly damaged and the \$55 contained in it was missing.

The first vehicle, stolen from McPhail's garage, was damaged when a back bumper was torn from it, apparently by efforts to tow it out of a ditch where it had become mired during the period between the two robberies. Police theorized that the first robbery occurred shortly after 10 p.m., while they fixed the time of the second robbery at 12:45 a.m.

Police had several definite leads to work on. Both cars and the garages were checked for fingerprints. A shirt, apparently belonging to one of the men was found in McPhail's garage, and other clues turned up in the course of the investigation.

IT'S OUR OPINION

Dear John

A decade or more ago, during World War II, as we recall, the 'Dear John' letter was a feature of the life of GI Joe. An American soldier serving overseas might get a letter from the young wife he had left Stateside informing him that their hasty marriage had been a mistake and that she was instituting divorce proceedings in order that she might be free to marry some smart cookie who had dodged the draft.

Such a kick in the serviceman's solar plexus came to be known as a 'Dear John' letter. Seems to us someone even wrote a song with that title.

Now we are borrowing it to write an open letter to our new Prime Minister, John Diefenbaker. The connection is that we, too, have received a missive that hits us in a soft spot. For the second time in less than a year we have been charged with the same offence: to wit, we have failed to file the monthly returns for the month of April, 1957, pursuant to The Excise Tax Act. In less legal verbiage we had neglected to remit to the Receiver General by May 31st, 10 percent of all job printing we had done during the month of April.

Dear John, we are guilty as sin. We failed to send in our cheque on time, as has happened before, and well may happen again. Not because we have criminal tendencies, John. It's just a matter of time; of not enough time to do all the things one must do if one is to stay in business, in a modest way, in this hectic age.

But we plead extenuating circumstances, dear John. That form had to be filled out, that cheque mailed, by May 31st. Remember how busy you were about that time, John? Would you have found time from your campaigning to tote up the number of miles you had travelled during April, for forwarding, perhaps, to the Bureau of Statistics?

We in the small printing shops were busy about that time, too. Our thoughts were centred on clearing the last election jobs, on getting out that important pre-election issue on schedule. We had more to worry about than the fact the Receiver General must be served, no matter how big his surplus. Our desk was a mess, and somewhere beneath the pile were those forms the Sales Tax people say must be filed every month.

Dear John, we aren't asking you to get us off this hook. We will pay whatever penalty the court demands. But we must admit it hurts. It hits us way down deep where our pride of citizenship lies buried, yet a living thing. We feel unjustly treated, trod upon.

In your housecleaning of the federal government, dear John, could you remove the cobwebs that seem to have enveloped our tax-gathering agencies? There are bugs

in the system, you probably realize. We have a notion that there are also buggars, guys with an authoritarian complex who delight in throwing the letter of the law at their less fortunate fellow countrymen who have not the weight of government behind them.

Dear John, please take a second look at this Sales Tax legislation. Is it just and right that one's government should force any citizen into the role of a tax collector; an unpaid tax gatherer, in fact; one who must pay a yearly \$2.00 fee for the questionable privilege of adding 10 percent to the cost of every printing job he accepts? To add insult to injury, that 10 percent must be remitted in the following month, whether or not the printer has been paid, no matter if he has not found time to send out his bills; regardless of the fact he is paying 10 percent on an account that may turn out to be a total loss, utterly uncollectible.

John, it just isn't right. Collection agencies charge as much as 40 percent to bring in doubtful accounts. Why should our government expect us to do it for free, to pay a collector's license and pay again through the nose in penalties if we prove not too efficient in this business of collecting for the treasury?

And if you look at our taxing laws from the worms-eye viewpoint, dear John, don't overlook The Income Tax Act. Here again the small businessman is serving as an unpaid collector for National Revenue. He must remit payroll deductions by the 15th of the following month, or else. He is not only a collector of Income Tax; he pays through the nose, too, and he may be paying another \$400 or more to an outside accountant because the Revenue boys are not satisfied with his system of bookkeeping.

Dear John, it sometimes seems to this one owner of a small business that his government keeps a corps of slap-happy heavyweights hovering impatiently just beyond the floodlights, ready to pounce on any upstart who dares enter the business ring despite the odds against him. If one carries enough weight, the Treasury referees use the slow count, (or the fast write-off). If one fails to connect, (or have the proper connections), he's down for the count. And how those federal tax-collectors seem to revel in pushing our noses into the canvas.

Dear John, if you find time to measure the competency of those tax-gatherers in the Revenue branch, please use the Golden Rule. Throw out of their soft sits all those who have yet to hear the ages-old dictum "do unto others as you would have others do unto you."

We are not only being taxed to death, we are being harried, too. And we don't like it.

We are for individual enterprise as opposed to public ownership. But individual enterprise we interpret as just that, a person, any person or group of persons, being in a position to make a million, or lose as much, according to their own business acumen.

When government is brought in on the deal, when giant corporations shuffle their holdings or absorb other companies simply for the purpose of gaining tax concessions, we see the capitalist system we now know providing ammunition for the socialists and the Reds who challenge our economic system.

We see innumerable evidences of smart fellows in the know making millions while most of us are mired in our economic rut. And this week's report in Time Magazine on quick profits on the Trans-Canada pipeline is a classic example of the weaknesses in our capitalistic system.

C. D. Howe and his Liberal cohorts lost the June 10th election mainly because of their insistence that the Trans-Canada Pipe Line legislation must go through the House of Commons without debate. Closure was instituted time after time to shut off Opposition questioning of government plans to build the uneconomical Northern Ontario section of the line and to lend another \$50 million to finance the building of the line to Winnipeg. The excuse was speed. Alberta gas had to reach its Eastern market without delay and only Trans-Canada could promise early completion, it was argued.

The line is far from completion almost a year later, but the stench of that legislation gives more than a whiff of gas.

This week's Time tells us that early investors in Trans-Canada have piled up more than 250 million dollars in paper profits already, simply from stock market gains.

High finance is over our head, but let Time tell it:

"The paper profits are the more dazzling by comparison with the pessimistic picture of prospects that pipeline supporters painted

a year ago.

"The Big Melon. Trans-Canada itself raised \$54 million by stock sales. The five original backers invested some \$15 million in stock at a bargain of \$8 a share. These holdings are now worth \$43 a share, or \$82 million. Three key men — Trans-Canada Chairman Nathan Tanner, President Charles Coates and Wall Street Broker Francis Kernan — got personal options to pay \$1,160,000 for stock now worth \$6,235,000. Influential speculators got big chunks of the \$37.5 million public issue, which is now worth \$161 million.

"Credit for the biggest percentage went to Vancouver Oilman Ralph K. Farris, son of a Liberal Senator and founder of the Northern Ontario Natural Gas Co. Ltd., one of the main distributors of Trans-Canada gas. Farris got 37,500 shares of Northern Ontario at a cost of only four-fifths of a cent a share. The stock now sells for \$20, and Farris' investment of \$300 is worth \$750,000. Gas Executive Gordon K. McLean of Edmonton paid \$5,287 for holdings worth \$2,115,000. C. Spencer Clark, a Seattle gas man, invested \$6,725 in stocks that would now sell for \$1,120,000. Total paper profit: \$18,234,142.

"The grand total paper profit from the four companies, based on last week's stock prices, comes to \$300,691,246. Brokers attribute the hot bidding partly to the pipe network's huge publicity, but do not think the stocks are overpriced. The companies' biggest worry is the angry glint in the new Prime Minister's eye, which might lead to a royal commission to find out who all the lucky insiders were."

This Trans-Canada deal apparently was everything and more the Opposition made it out to be a year ago. We trust the Diefenbaker forces will be just as searching, and more effective now that they hold power, in cutting, not the flow of oil from Alberta, but the paper profits of those who were making millions at the cost of good government.

Flight From TV Habit

Comes Guy Lombardo, leader of the noted band known as "Royal Canadians", to say that people are "losing the TV habit".

"We all went through the stage where we sat glued to the screen, but we're coming out of it."

Lombardo ought to know; he has been appearing on TV for two years.

There is other evidence to back up the Lombardo verdict; the fact that heavier book sales and more book lending by lending libraries indicate that people are going back to books; the growth of newspaper circulation; the flight of big advertisers from TV as an advertising media.

Perhaps the reason for all this is that TV was oversold. It was going to have a tremendous impact on our social habits, standardize our thinking, even revolutionize our policies. Indeed, according to the wizards of Madison Avenue, people would no longer attend political meetings; all a president of the United States or a prime minister of Canada would have to do in an election would be to make two or three TV appearances.

The last United States presidential election made nonsense of such predictions, and the current election campaigns in Canada has made more nonsense of it. Mr. Eisenhower, after two or three TV performances, discovered that his "viewers" were too few to be safe and promptly took to the hustings; while in Canada these past few weeks the opinion has been reached that the impact of TV speeches is negligible.

Perhaps the fault, the reason for this decline in TV interest, lies in the quality of TV programs. Occasionally there is something worth seeing, and sometimes there are things superlatively good, but too often TV programs are for morons or groundlings, with third-rate or even fifth-rate performers presented as "artists" or "stars".

TV, it may be, will do a comeback. But if it does it will have to get program producers with more taste and intelligence.

30 Years Of Change

On the 30th anniversary of Lindbergh's famous flight, an Air Force jet covered exactly the same route from New York to Paris. It took six hours and 37 minutes to cover the 4,002 miles. It took Lindbergh 33½ hours in 1927.

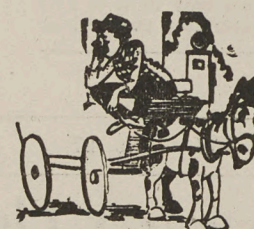

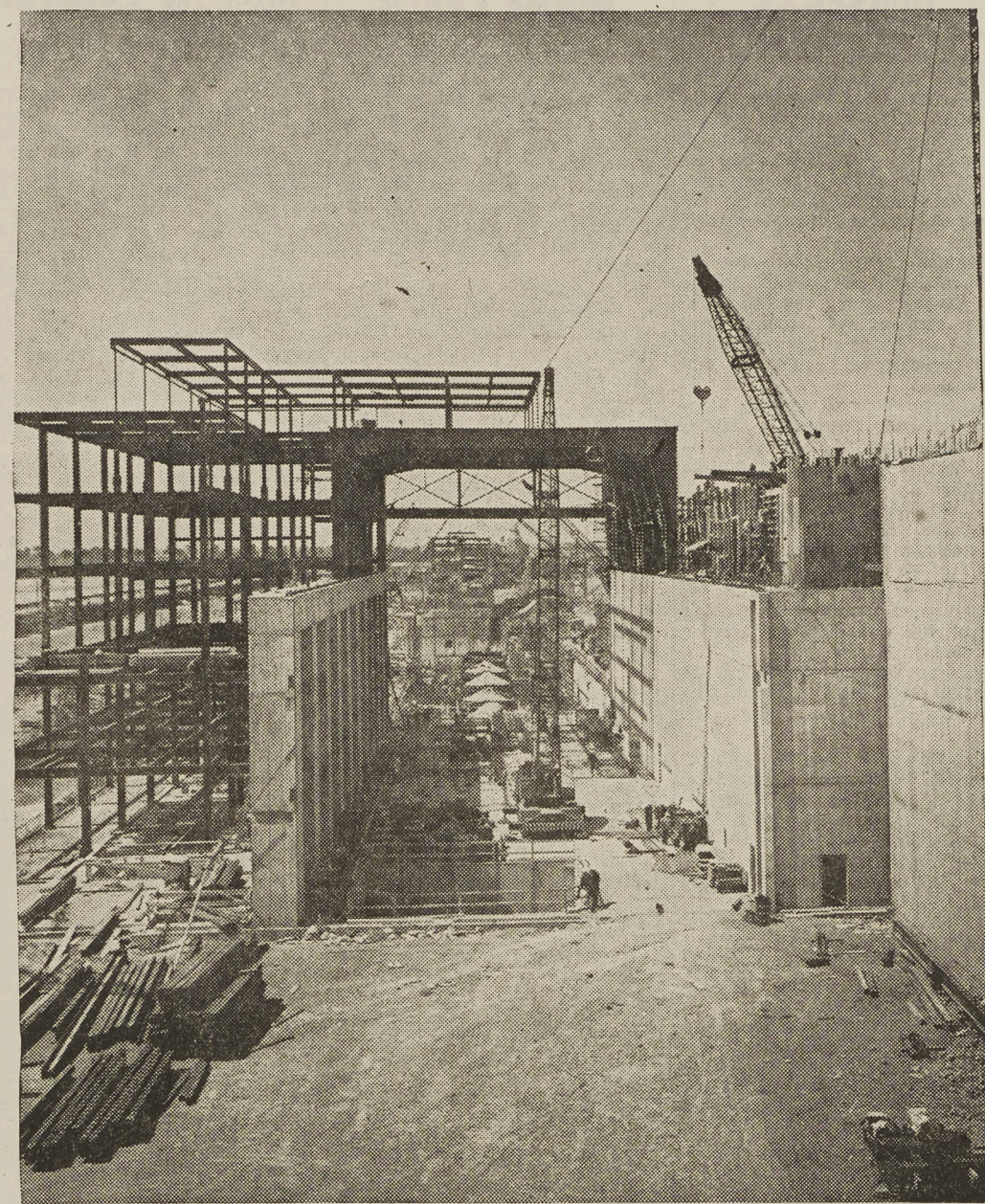
Wrestling Card Disappoints Again

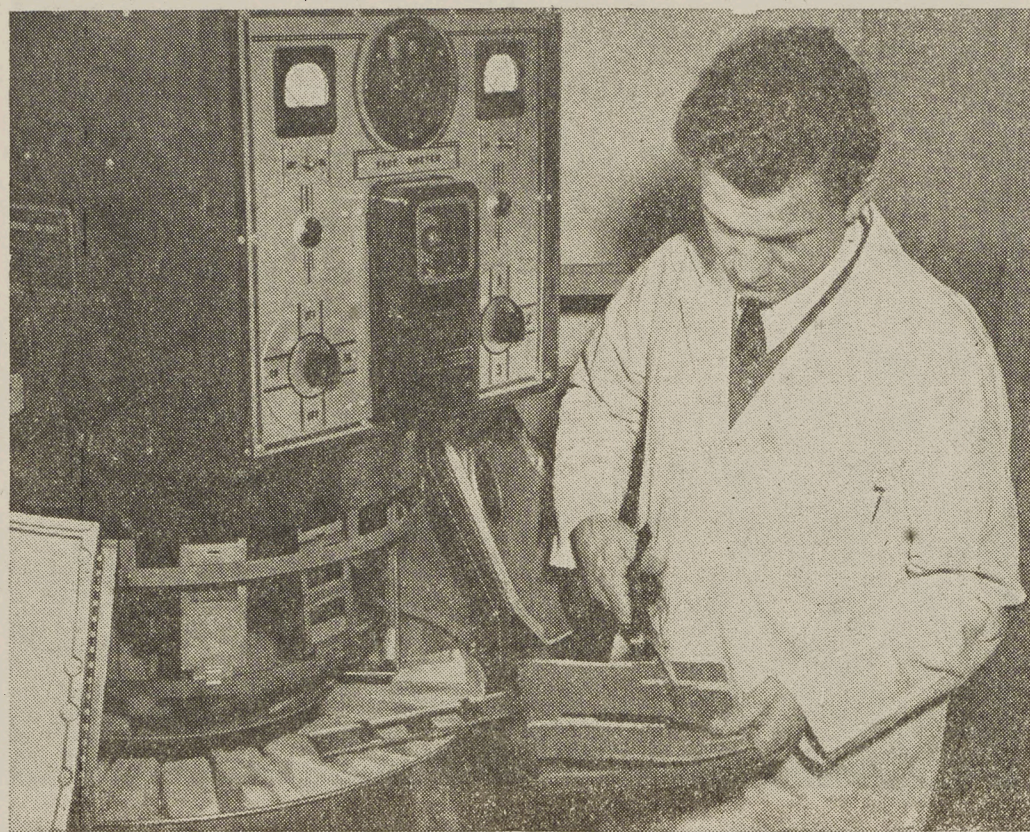

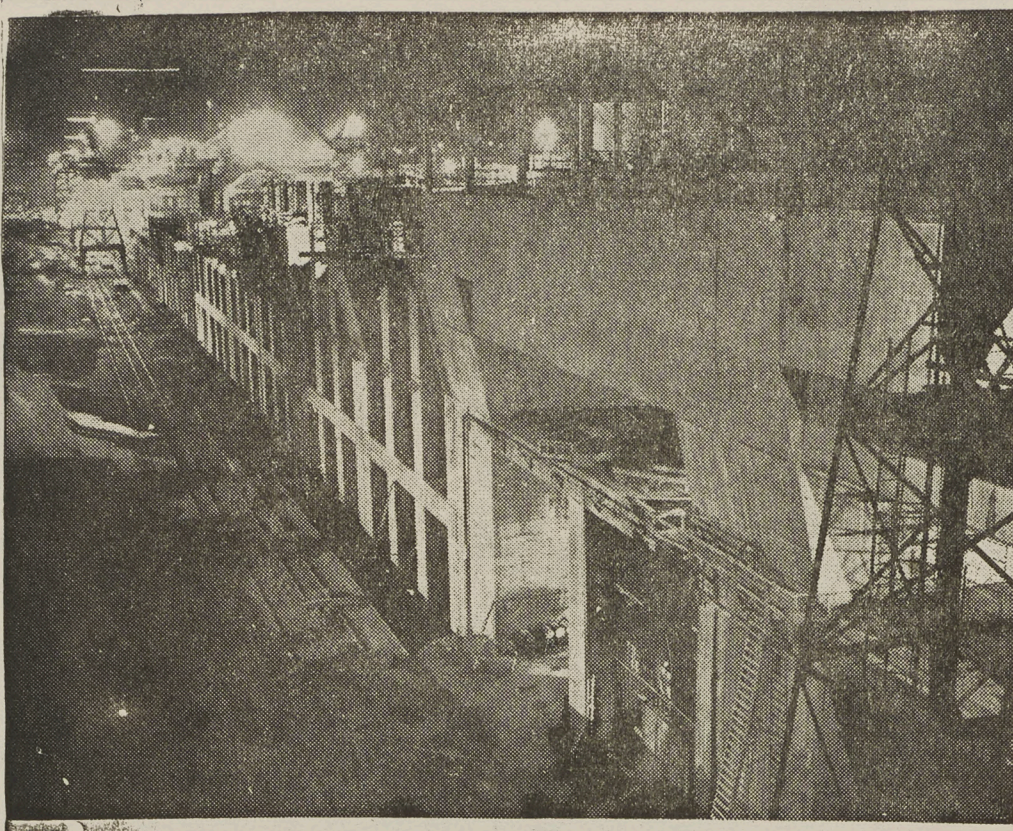

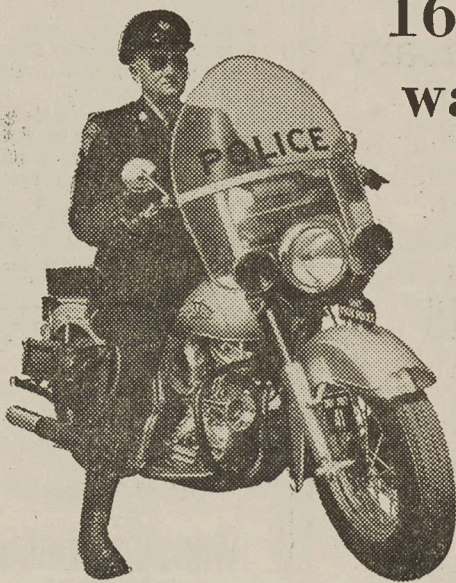

NEW CNR LINE — By autumn of 1957 trains will be running on a new \$3,000,000 spur line being built by Canadian National Railways in northern New Brunswick. Twenty-three miles long, the railway will link the Heath Steele base metal lines at Little Tomogons River to the CNR's Montreal - Saint John - Halifax main line at Bartibog. Construction has been carried on through the winter months and about 10 miles of the line are now ready for tie and track laying. Modern Construction Company of Moncton has the contract for the building of the sub-grade, and CNR crews will carry out the track-laying work. Extension Of Time On "Safety" Essay For Secondary School Students

Since examinations required concentration at this season of the year, it has been decided to extend the time for the writing of the Safety Essay to July 30th.

This essay on "Accidents On the Highways and How To Prevent Them" is being sponsored by the Federation of Agriculture.

(1) All secondary school students are eligible.

(2) All essays received will be submitted for this year only to zone level for first judging.

(3) Essays to be 500 words or less.

(4) The main idea behind the essay is to develop ways and means of preventing the terrific slaughter on the highways. Therefore, it is felt that 85 marks should be given for subject matter, five for spelling, five for grammar and five for appearance.

Essays may be sent to Mrs. Francis McLeod, RR 2, Greenfield, Ont., who will forward them to the zone chairwoman for judging. The best of these in turn will be sent to Toronto for final judging.

More Informed Farm People Is Sought

Ways and means of providing information for farmers about the activities of farm organizations were discussed at a recent meeting of the Federation of Agriculture held here.

The directors of the Glengarry unit of the Federation of Agriculture are seriously considering an experiment in township and concession organization whereby the link between the farmer and the groups which serve him would be created. Ray Hergott, OFA fieldman, described such a plan in detail, calling it "Machine X". Further steps are to be studied after threshing has been completed.
