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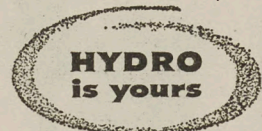

Moose Creek Church Looks Back 121 Years

The 121st anniversary of Knox Presbyterian Church, Moose Creek, will be observed on Sunday, September 20th, 1959, when the Rev. (Dr.) C. Ritchie Bell of Montreal, will be the guest speaker at the hours of 11 o'clock a.m. and 8 o'clock p.m.

The Roxborough district began to be settled after the turn of the 19th century.

As early as 1826 with the settlement of the Rev. Archibald Connell at Martintown and Indian Lands (which was an outpost preaching station) it is believed that the occasional home service was held in the Roxborough district.

In the year 1838 the Rev. Daniel Clark became the first minister of the United Congregations of Indian Lands, Roxborough and Kenyon congregations.

The present church was built in the year 1900 and dedicated on February 10th, 1901, when the Rev. Lauchlin Beaton was minister.

Laud Minister At Presbytery Meet

When the Presbytery of Glengarry held its regular meeting in St. John's Church, recently, an influential delegation from Kenyon Church, Dunvegan, spoke of the pride the congregation felt in the fact its minister, Rev. Dr. Donald N. MacMillan, had been chosen to fill the chair of Systematic Theology in the Presbyterian College, Montreal. This helped to mitigate the regret they felt at the prospective ending of his long and fruitful ministry, extending over more than 24 years.

Members of Presbytery also expressed their regret at losing his services from the court, in whose counsels he had played a major part.

At the request of the Session, Rev. Iver D. MacIver, Maxville, was appointed Interim Moderator of Dunvegan, the charge to be declared vacant on September 20th.

A second vacancy was created by the resignation of Rev. S. D. Self from the charge of St. Andrew's, Lancaster, in order to accept a position in extension work in the Presbytery of Kingston. From Lancaster also, a number of representatives testified to the success with which Mr. Self had labored among them and the esteem in which he was held. Rev. Douglas J. Fox, Vankleek Hill, was appointed Interim Moderator, to declare the pulpit vacant on September 27th.

The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated at the opening of the session. Rev. D. J. Fox was appointed Moderator of Presbytery for the ensuing year, in succession to Rev. W. A. Douglas, Avonmore, who was cordially thanked for his services during the past 12 months.

Dr. MacMillan and his family had previously been feted by the ministers of Presbytery and their wives at a dinner in the hall of St. Andrew's Church, Lancaster.

This minister of northern affairs says: "It's in the bag!"

What's in the bag? A loaf of bread — broken up to last longer. Father is the photographer — with mother and baby brother well back behind him. For this is a highlight of a "camping out" holiday, so carefully planned that expenditures didn't exceed the sum of money set aside for it.

The budget of the Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources at Ottawa covers a number of departmental branches. Among these are National Parks, Water Resources, Forestry, and Northern Administration and Lands. His expenditures involve millions of dollars.

Money for all departments of government comes through the Minister of Finance who gets it largely in taxes from Canadians such as you. When more money is spent than is collected in taxes, government must borrow from you . . . or else create new money. The creation of new money is one factor that leads to inflation . . . which means your dollar buys less and less.

The government has been spending more than you have been paying in taxes. To narrow the gap between income and expenditures, new taxes have been imposed.

The next step should be to reduce expenditures, or at least hold the line. Undertaking new commitments — adding new welfare or other services — will only make it that much more difficult to pay our way. Tell your M.P. at Ottawa that since you are trying to save, you expect government to do the same.

You also help when you save more by means of life insurance, savings deposits, and the purchase of government bonds. Your savings help to create a SOUND dollar; and this, in turn, helps to create job security for you and more jobs for other Canadians.

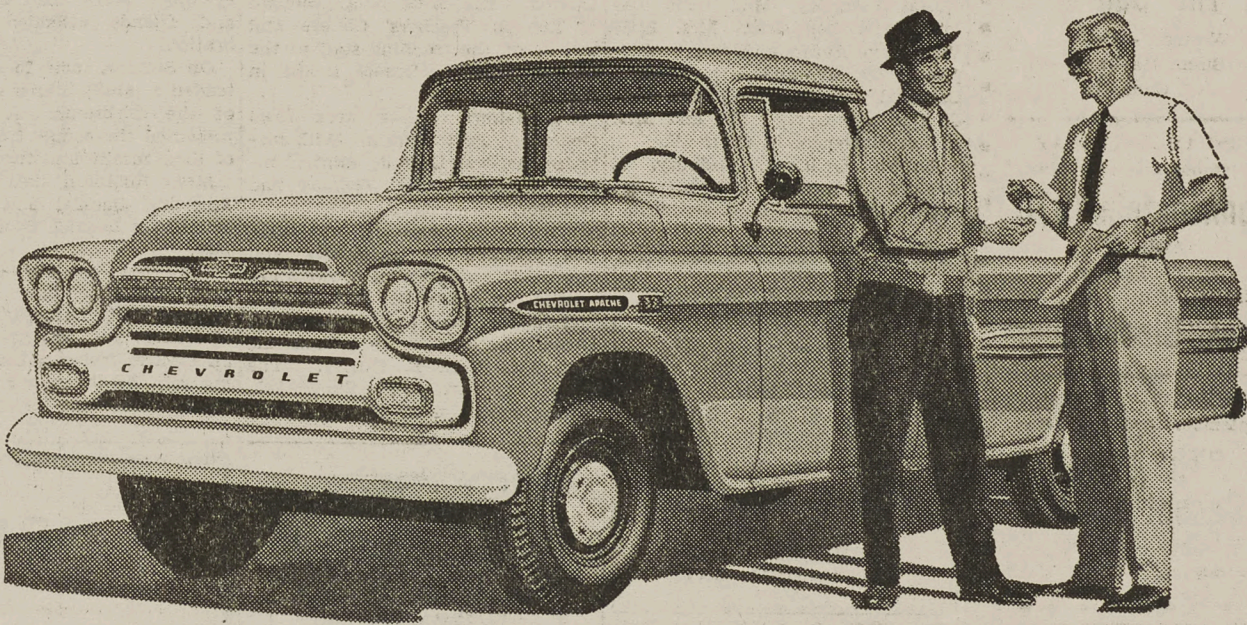
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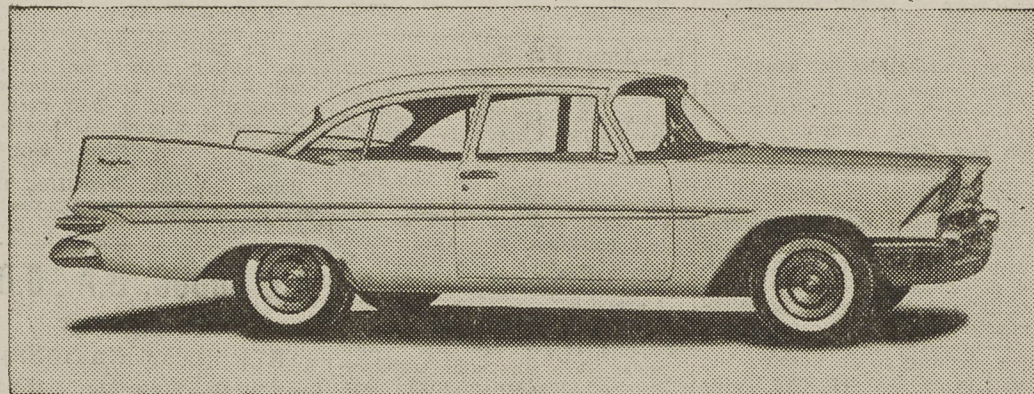
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
